CRAPAUD DAIRYING Co.—The annual meeting of the Crapaud Dairying Company was held on the 18th inst., and the following were appointed Directors: Messrs R. C. Lea, R. Lord, Geo. Sturdy, Wm. Francis, L. B. Trowsdale, W. J. Newsom, Joseph McDonald, and Donald McLean, Secy. Last year 1,565,216 lbs of milk were taken, and the output of butter was 66,822 lbs, which realized \$12,487 20. The butter was sold in England, Halifax, St. John N. B., Montreal and Charlottetown. Mr. Geo. Burgess is the butter-maker at Crapaud, and he is a good one.

MONROE, Jan. 29.—Mrs. Wortman, relict of the late Stipendiary Magistrate Wortman, died very suddenly yesterday morning about 10 o'clock. She got up as usual and had breakfast, but afterwards complained of feeling unwell, and when her medical attendant reached her bedside she was breathing her last. The deceased lady was 82 years of age and survived her husband only a few months. There were only two days' difference in their ages, and in death they were not long divided. Stipendiary Magistrate Wortman also died very suddenly, though he had been in failing health for some time.
