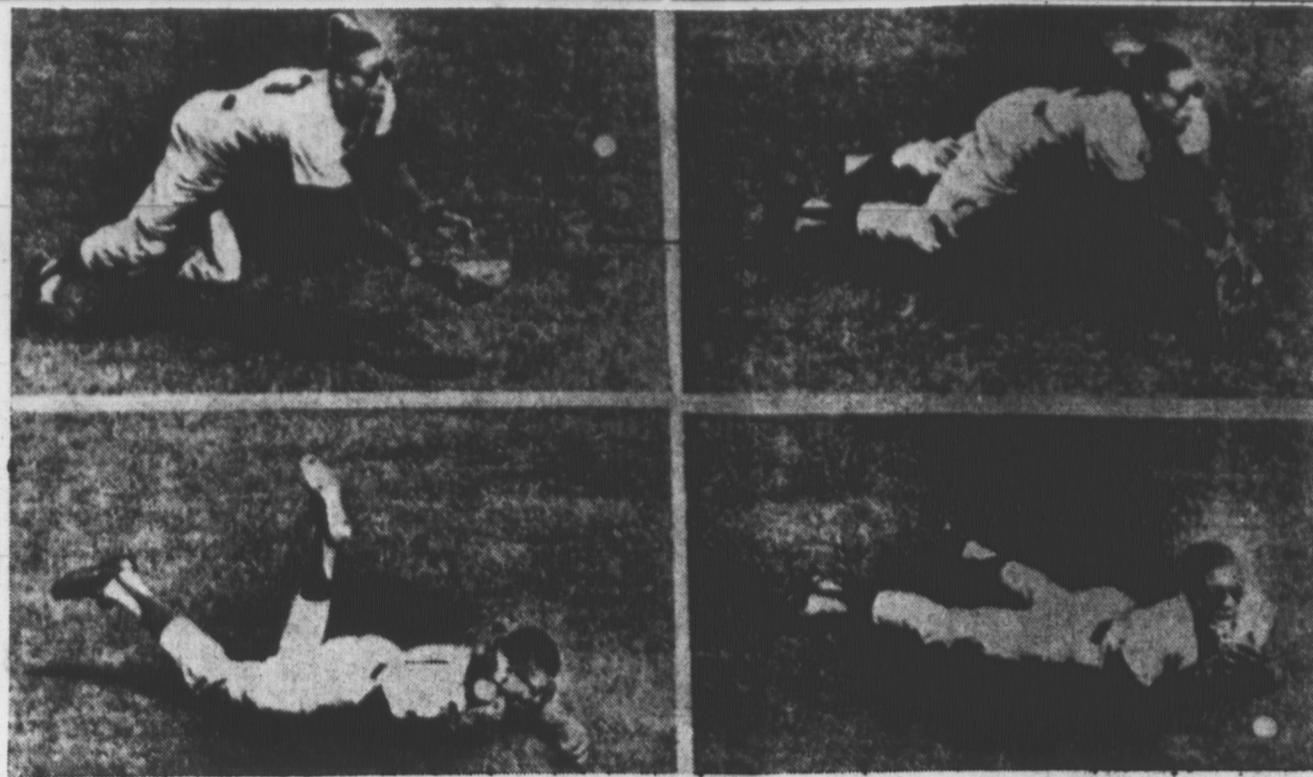

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Maury Wills, Los Angeles captain and general in charge of bunts and lead-swings, feels the Dodgers' go-go attack forced Minnesota Twins to go back to fundamentals—one of the hardest things for major league players to do. "A type of game like ours will force players to rely on fundamentals," Wills said in the Dodgers dressing room. "Players who have been around a long time have forgotten fundamentals and find it hard to go back."

And that — forcing opposing players to cover first base and reminding them to throw to the left infield. Wills is the theory behind the Dodgers' success.

"We take advantage of the fact that playing fundamental baseball is difficult, and we make other teams go back to them, which actually puts them at a disadvantage."

SEIZED ADVANTAGE
The Dodgers certainly took advantage of the Twins, building a 7-2 World Series victory with 10 hits, six of which never left the infield.
