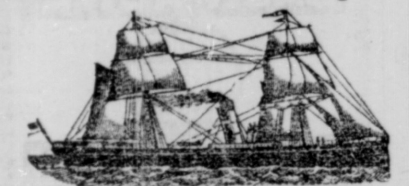
SALVATION ARMY REBELS.—A Toronto despatch says that the seceders from the Salvation Army have organized under the name of the United Christian Workers. A general conference has been held, attended by about 300 delegates and members. A constitution and articles of belief have been drafted which are broad in the extreme. Finances are to be provided by purely voluntary contributions, no salary to exceed \$6 to a single officer or \$12 to a married man.

NANCY HANKS, 2.04.

Makes Another Record.

TERREHAUTE, Ind., Sept. 29. Nancy Hanks trotted a mile here yesterday in 2.04, breaking the world's record for light harness for either trotting or pacing.

More Sealers Seized.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 29. The sealing schooner God has reached here from Petropaulovski and reports the seizure by Russians of two more Victoria sealers. The Maria, Captain Balcan, was seized by the cruiser Zbicka, and the Carmelite by the revenue cutter Vidua. Both vessels were confiscated and taken to Petropaulovski. The Maria is owned at Maitland, N. S., was purchased at Yarmouth and left via St. John, N. B., last November. The Carmelite is owned by J. W. Peppett, North Sydney, C. B.

Races at Pembroke.

PEMBROKE, Me., Sept. 29. In the races yesterday, first honors went to Nova Scotia. The only trotting was the 2 30 class. The Berling Sea King owned by A. Shipp, of Yarmouth; Willy Walley, owned by Hill, of Calais, C. H. Easton's, Black Jack. Sea King won in three straight heats, leading all through each time. Time, 2.36, 2.38 and 2.30.

A Record Beater.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 29. Jowett, of the Detroit Athletic Club, ran 220 yards in 21.35 seconds on the Yale field yesterday. This is the best United States record, and equals the Canadian record made by him at Montreal last Saturday.

On the Way Home.

OTTAWA, Sept. 29. Governor Daly and Archbishop O'Brien returned here from the Pacific coast yesterday. They were entertained by Sir John Thompson, and afterwards visited the exhibition now in progress.

Another Fire.
