

## Rangers Nip Black Hawks; Rod Gilbert Gets Winner

CHICAGO (AP) — Rod Gilbert's 24th and 25th goals of the season paced New York Rangers to a 3-2 victory over Black Hawks in a sloppily played National Hockey League game here Tuesday night.

The game, the last Hawks' home game of the regular season, was interrupted for 15 minutes in the final period while fans littered the ice with garbage.

Gilbert opened the scoring at 6:06 of the first period when he tipped a long shot by Rod

Seiling behind Hawk netminder off the net post to DeJordy's right.

Ken Wharram evened the score with a power-play goal at 10:44. It was a 40-footer that went into the net after banging period when Gilbert took a pass

from Ratelle and rammed a 35-footer past a screened DeJordy for the clinching tally.

Hawk defenceman Matt Ravlich concluded the scoring in the last period by knocking his own rebound behind Marcel Paille after carrying the puck the length of the ice.

The garbage barrage started when referee John Ashley gave the Hawks' Red Hay a slashing penalty followed by a 10-minute misconduct for arguing too vehemently.

## W. MacDonald Foursome Upsets Manitoba Quartet

PORT ARTHUR (CP)—Prince Edward Island dropped Manitoba from the unbeaten ranks in third-round play in the Canadian Seniors curling championships.

Dr. Wendell MacDonald of Charlottetown upset Leo Johnson's Manitoba rink 10-3. The Islanders, Ontario and British Columbia were the only unbeaten rinks after the third round.

Alfie Phillips of Ontario crushed Harold Mabey of New Brunswick 11-4 and Fred Tinning of B.C. won 8-5 over Quebec's Ronald Wright.

In other third-round matches, George Giannou of Newfoundland upset Henry Berg of Sas-

katchewan 8-3 and Arnold Chisnell of Northern Ontario got its first victory, an 8-4 win over Avarad Mann of Nova Scotia. Alberta had the bye.

Third-round results left unheralded Prince Edward Island and Ontario tied for first with 3-0 records. Finishing in Vancouver was second with 2-0.
