Offers Bia Price For Toronto Jail Farm

TORONTO (CP)—A New York City syndicate has offered the City of Toronto \$1,500,000 for its 600-acre jail farm at suburban Langstaff where the syndicate hopes to build a project of 1,500 houses, apartments, industry and commerce, a real estate man said here Tuesday.

Cost of the proposed project would be about \$30,000,000, with homes selling around \$10,000. If the city will sell, the syndicate hopes to start construction next spring.

Mr. Paterson asked Mr. McInnis, who was present at the annual meeting, to give an overall picture of the provincial situation with regard to Film Council progress. At the close of his remarks, Mr. McInnis urged more community National Film shows as a summer innovation.

The present slate of officers were returned for another year, viz: president, Rev. W. Paterson; secretary, Mr. S. Walker; treasurer, Mrs. S. Walker. It was moved that Mr. C. Lelecheur fill the office of vice-president which was vacant.

Canadian, U. S. Railroads Call For A Fair Deal

MONTREAL (CP)—Top spokesmen for Canadian and American railroads Tuesday called for a fair deal in transportation competition.

A need for regulations embracing equal opportunities was urged by N. R. Crump, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway and Richard G. May of Washington, vice-president in charge of the operations and maintenance department of the Association of American Railroads.

Both spoke at the joint annual meeting, held for the first time in Canada, of AAR's mechanical division and electrical section.

Mr. Crump told the 1,000 delegates it is no secret that railways on this continent have not been earning an attractive return on investment compared with other industries.

Although transportation has become a highly competitive business, transportation agencies are subject to "varying and unequal degrees" of regulation, much of it based on an assumption that railways still have a monopoly.

The railways ask only for equality of both opportunity and responsibility under regulated competition, said Mr. Crump, with the emphasis on greater freedom and less restraint upon the economic forces of supply and demand.

Mr. May urged creation of a "two-way street" in transportation and an end to "one-way competition."

Bills now are before the U.S. Congress, said Mr. May, to provide for "increased reliance on competitive forces in rate-making." Government regulation would be limited to fixing maximum rates, as protection against excessive charges, and minimum rates as an assurance of compensation for a specific type of carrier. Within these limits the forces of competition would be given free play to set prices on transportation service.
