STILL ANOTHER

LIBERAL SPEAKS.

STILL another Liberal newspaper, "The Vankleek Hill Review," of Ontario, speaks in condemnation of the Liberal leaders in their acts. We quote: "The leaders appeared to go mad with delight upon assuming office and forgot entirely the professed principles upon which they were elected. The men who elected them have not forgotten those principles, and they still stand by those principles. "The Review, as an independent paper, has repeatedly protested against the mistakes of the leaders. We do so again, and in this we are not alone in this country. MISS PAULINE JOHNSON

At the Opera House Last Night

A small audience greeted Miss E. Pauline Johnson at the Opera House last evening. Those who stayed away on account of the inclement weather missed a great treat, a treat which would have amply repaid them, as it did those who were present, for braving the mud and the rain.

Shortly after eight o'clock Miss Johnson appeared clad in Indian garb, and looking what she claims to be, a Mohawk Indian of Indian parentage. The first part of the programme consisted principally of conversational descriptions of a few amusing incidents about the various "churches" that had happened within Miss Johnson's observation, of three poems, "Wolverine," "Qu'Appelle" and "The Riders of the Plains."

After a short intermission Miss Johnson re-appeared in a white silk evening dress and entertained the audience with a very amusing comedietta, treating of the social extravagances of the wife of a Canadian M. P., after which she closed with the recitation of another poem, "Canadian Born." This programme was interspersed with anecdotes, stories and satirical sayings which combined with it to make the evening a very pleasant one.

The poems, and in fact everything given, were Miss Johnson's own composition. Especially we may mention "Qu'Appelle," very beautiful legend combined with the meaning of the river "Qu'Appelle." Her patriotic poems, "The Riders of the Plains" and "Canadian Born" are good, full of fire, and, like all her poems, have the true poetic ring. On the stage she is full of vivacity and charm, and the audience, though so small, applauded her vigorously throughout the evening.

The entertainment was one of the finest things that it has been the privilege of a Charlottetown audience to enjoy. It is no easy task for any one single-headed to interest an audience for two hours, but in this Miss Pauline Johnson succeeded admirably well. Her entertaining powers are of the very highest order, and last night she delighted the few who heard her.

Miss Pauline Johnson has already taken her place among colonial poets. It is a very high place; and we feel sure that with her vigor of mind and body she will yet go higher.
