AN OBJECTIONABLE LAW.—The Montreal Gazette refers to the act recently passed by our Legislature making it necessary for any creditor selling goods through a commercial traveller, and who has to resort to the courts for the purpose of collecting the amount of his claim for goods or for promissory notes or acceptances, to prove at the trial that the commercial traveller who effected such sale had at the time a license under the provisions of the act and says: Montreal merchants look on the act in question as inimical to their interest, and the Bankers' Association will consult their legal adviser to ascertain whether it cannot be disallowed as unconstitutional by the Governor-General-in-Council. The Council of the Board of Trade will probably petition for such disallowance if it be decided that such could be done.
