

Atlantics In 5-3 Win Over Miners At Glace Bay

GLACE BAY, N.S., Nov. 12 (CP)—Halifax Atlantics led all the way tonight to defeat Glace Bay Miners 5-3 and widen their margin at the top of the four-team Maritime Major Hockey League.

Atlantics had a 2-0 lead at the end of the first period, and were never behind in the game despite the edge in shots by Miners.

Roy McMeekin, in the Halifax cage, had 39 stops against 23 for Don Lockhart.

The victory put Atlantics four points ahead of Sydney Millionaires, idle tonight.

Scoring for Halifax were Bill Ford, Doug McPhee, Carroll Bloom, Frank Bergeron and Bill Gould. Glace Bay marksmen were Hub Macey, Gordie Miller and Pop Baker.

Goals by McPhee, the Saint John N.B. native who performed last year with Halifax St. Mary's Juniors, and Gould gave Atlantics the edge in the first period.

Bergeron added another for Halifax in the second while Macey tallied for Miners, to add to the one scored by Baker in the first.

Ford and Bloom hit the mark in the first period and Miller rounded out the Miners scoring.

Only one penalty was handed out and that was to Gould in the third

period.

Within the next few days the Charlottetown Islanders hope to have defenseman Orville Laval and goaltender Al Millar within their ranks. Hergesheimer Paces N. Y. Rangers To 5-2 Victory Over Black Hawks

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (CP)—Wally Hergesheimer blasted home four goals tonight to lead the down-trodden New York Rangers to a 5-2 victory over Chicago Black Hawks in a bruising National Hockey League game that was marked by frequent fights and high-sticking.

Hergesheimer's four goals enabled the little right winger to take over the circuit lead in that department from Toronto's Max Bentley. Wally has 10 goals to Bentley's nine. It also marked the second time this season that Hergesheimer has scored at least three goals in one game.

The smallest Madison Square Garden crowd of the season, 5,130 fans, witnessed the bitterly contested game that threatened to turn into a free-for-all on numerous occasions.

Jim McFadden opened the scoring for Chicago in the first period, driving a puck into an empty net while the Rangers were short-handed.

Hergesheimer took over from there. He split the defence and tied the score late in the first period and netted again early in the second session, nearly faking goalie Al Rollins out of position.

The rough third period opened by Hergesheimer tipping in Steve Kraftcheck's long pass from just inside the blue line to give the Rangers a 3-1 advantage. Gus Bodnar poked one home for Chicago a little more than a minute later but that was Chicago's last gasp.

Paul Ronty skated in alone on Rollins at 13:10 and shot. Al Dewsbury attempted to clear but batted the puck into his own net instead. Less than a minute later Hergesheimer evaded Dewsbury-deked Rollins out of position and tallied his fourth goal to wrap it up.

Shortly thereafter both sides began to lose their temper. Hy Buller of the Rangers and Chicago's Cal Gardner came to blows but were given only minor penalties.

While both were cooling off, Fred Glover of the Hawks tripped Ranger goalie Lorne Worsley from behind. The two then swung sticks. Allan Stanley of the Rangers then tangled with Glover and both received minor and major penalties. During the last minute of play Ed Kullman of the Rangers high sticked defenceman Gus Morrison drawing blood.

The victory was the Rangers' second of the season and their first since Oct. 29.

So all the Canadiens can do is wait and there's no doubt but that Bellevue is worth waiting for. Here's what Phil Watson, former Ranger centre who is coaching the Quebec Citadels had to say about "Le Gros Bill." "I have never seen a young forward with as much ability as Bellevue has. If he has one fault, it is that he often appears lazy on the ice. That's probably because he is so much better than the other players in his league. He seems to know he can score any time he wants to. And he usually does, often in rink-long solos."

Orders Rivera On Indefinite Probation

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (AP)—Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick today ordered Jim Rivera placed on indefinite probation and said that one more slip by the Chicago White Sox outfielder would result in his expulsion from baseball.

Frick, who intimated the penalty imposed upon Rivera was lenient, said the player will be permitted to play with the White Sox but ordered the Chicago club to report any incident of misbehavior on or off the playing field in which Rivera is involved. Making it clear that he considered Rivera guilty of a certain type of moral delinquency despite his exoneration by an Illinois grand jury on a charge of rape last month, the Commissioner prohibited the White Sox from transferring Rivera's contract for a period of one year and placed the burden of responsibility for his conduct on the club.

"The Commissioner recognizes, as does the Chicago American League club," Frick said, "that they have an obligation to the public to maintain the highest possible standards of morality among all men who are connected with the game."

Frick disclosed that he summoned Rivera to his office Oct. 20, four days after the rape charge had been dismissed, and reviewed the player's history.

"I made it clear to him that because of his previous difficulties he was a lucky boy to have gone as far as he has," said Frick.

The 29-year-old New York-born Puerto Rican was charged with raping a 22-year-old married woman in Chicago Sept. 28. Rivera admitted being intimate with the woman but denied using force. He previously served a five-year penitentiary sentence on a similar charge while in the army.

"I told him exactly where he stands," said Frick. "I told him that he had come into baseball with two strikes on him, that it was impossible for him to start on an even footing with the other players. That was too bad but playing with him, but he owes the public an obligation. He must toe the mark or else."

In Chicago, Mrs. Grace Comiskey, president of the White Sox said: "I had hoped and prayed Rivera would be given another chance. He really deserves a chance because I believe the recent charge against him was unfair."

Yanks' Manager Levels Blast At Umpire Goetz

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (AP)—"Why doesn't Larry Goetz do his umpiring in the National League," asked George Weiss, general manager of the world champion New York Yankees Tuesday.

Goetz, speaking in Buffalo last night, said the Yankees "won" the crying championship even before they won the World Series.

Goetz, veteran National League umpire, labelled the Yankees the "cryingest team in the business." He also said the Yankees played the worst fielding World Series in Goetz's 18 years of big league experience.

"I'd suggest," Weiss said, "that if Goetz paid attention to what was going on in his own league and umpired on it, the games he was assigned to umpire by the president of his league, he would have plenty to do."

Yankees have won the American League pennant and the World Series the past four years.

Eskimos Waste Little Time In Celebrations

WINNIPEG, Nov. 12 (CP)—A business-like bunch of Edmonton Eskimos who took defeat in stride and came back to win, Tuesday took victory much the same way.

Winners over Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the Western football final, Eskimos lost little time in cheering and back-slapping and hustled back to their hotel to get on with the next job—packing gear for night flights to Edmonton.

The 100-odd fans who accompanied Esks here were more excited than the team as they whooped it up for Edmonton and "On to the Grey Cup."

Coach Frankie Filchock, whose old reliable crystal ball came through again—he said the Eskis would win although they dropped the first of the best-of-three series—said the whole team played terrific ball.

"You just couldn't single out one man," he said. "The boys did it again. That line was right in there every time."

"It was a good win and we beat a good ball team."

Still predicting victory in the Grey Cup, Filchock said he plans to dress for that game. A shoulder separation kept him out of the last two.

Either Toronto Argonauts or Hamilton Wildcats will be plenty tough, he said.

The Edmonton players joshed the press experts who went out on a limb and predicted two straight easy wins for Bombers, then had the limb sawed off behind them today.

But Filchock didn't mind it. "I'm glad they put it in the papers," he said. "I gave the team lots of fighting spirit."

George Trafton, coach of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers sat alone in his office a few minutes after his team lost. He said: "I just can't believe it—but there it is."
