

Saints Complete Season With Easy Victory On "A"

The Saint Dunstan's University Saints finished their 1966 football schedule Saturday with an easy 25-14 win over a weak Mount Allison team. The game saw the Saints play a lackadaisical brand of football, with their offence scoring only when necessary and their defence containing an inept Mount "A" offence.

The Saints used a crumpling ground attack, utilizing the speed of Jim Foley, John Kinsella and Cyril MacDonald for good yardage around the end and through the middle. With three minutes remaining in the first quarter, MacDonald garnered the first of his two touchdowns on an off-tackle smash

from the five yard line. Bob Driscoll kicked the ball through the uprights for the convert.

Following the kickoff, Mount "A" was knocking on the door at the 8 in 4 yard line. In three attempts the Saints held the Mounties and the SDU defence took over on their own yard line just as the gun closed the first quarter. Midway through the second quarter the Mounties were again in the Saint end zone. This time they made good from the Saint nine on a pass to halfback Rob Allen from quarter back Eric Springs. The convert was blocked leaving the score at 7-6. Just before the half ended, an electrifying 50 yard run by Jim Foley looked like a sure Major for the Red and White but the ball was called back to Mount "A" thirty on a clipping infraction.

Two plays later, the Saints lost the ball on a fumble and the half ended with the same 7-6.

Kinsella took the second-half kickoff 70 yards to the Mount "A" 20 where the Red and White bogged down and Mount "A" took over the ball to be held in turn by a rugged Saint defence who forced the Mounties to punt. Four plays later, Kinsella swept around the right end on a handoff from quarterback John Driscoll and scored on a twenty-five yard run. The convert was no good. On the next Saint possession, MacDonald scored another TD on a dive into the end zone, making the score 19-6 at the end of three quarters.

In the final quarter the Mounties pulled all stops in an attempt to win the first and last game of the year but a fired-up SDU defence led by Senior Ken Hubley refused to give way. Early in the quarter Jim Foley completed the Saint scoring on an eight yard sweep. The convert attempt went wide and the score stood at 25-6 with ten minutes left to play.

In this final part of the game, Coach Hilton used his second stringers and the Saint bench sat back to watch the clock. However, with two minutes remaining, a fumble in the Saint backfield allowed a Mount "A" defensive halfback, Ted Reynolds, to run 20 yards for a TD. The Mounties went for a two point conversion on which the Red and White were charged with an interference penalty which resulted in the Mounties being awarded the points. The game ended with the score standing 25-14.

The game lived up to expectations in that it was a nothing match from any viewpoint. It was a cellar battle, the Mounties didn't have the muscle to pull off a victory or to even threaten. The Saints, never being forced to extend themselves, didn't attempt to play a standout game. Only the local pass defence played really well and they have never been better than they were Saturday. In play a fier play, Kinsella, Driscoll, Clete Dunn, Gene MacDonald, and Bob Fellows demonstrated excellent timing and sheer determination to break up the Mount Allison passing plays.
