N.S. Youth Dies Hunting For Job

CORNWALL (CP)—A Nova Scotia youth, driving with companion to find work, died of carbon monoxide poisoning Monday as the two slept in their car on Highway 2, 20 miles from here. The body of Donald Francis MacKinnon, 19, of David Street River Ryan, N.S., was found on the back seat of an old-model car by police. Robert Hartwell, 23, of the same address, was dazed, vomiting and breathing faintly when police found the pair. He was taken to the Cornwall General Hospital, treated and allowed to leave Tuesday. Lee told police he and the dead youth left Nova Scotia last Saturday. They were killing time and pulled off the road for a sleep. He said they turned the engine off before retiring. Police found a hole in the engine manifold from which escaping carbon monoxide had leaked into the car and remained there when they stopped. Lee is believed to have headed back to Nova Scotia.

Hospital In Montreal Calls Blood Pressure Conference

MONTREAL (CP)—Canada's first international symposium on high blood pressure has been convened by the clinical research department of Montreal's Hotel Dieu Hospital in collaboration with the University of Montreal. The department, one of the world's foremost research institutions on high blood pressure, was founded 10 years ago and decided to celebrate its anniversary by calling the world's leading researchers to exchange ideas on the subject. The symposium is to be held Oct. 11-14 at Ste. Adele, Que., 45 miles north of Montreal. Participants will be 12 Canadian scientists, 20 from the United States, 15 from Europe, and five from South America. Dr. Jacques Genest, director of Hotel Dieu's research work, said 80 per cent of the papers to be presented at the symposium deal with new work. PROGRESS RAPID—Research in this field is going ahead so rapidly we have a hard time keeping up with each other," he said at a press conference Tuesday. Dr. Genest said United States-based foundations had offered to help pay for the symposium, but insisted money be raised in Canada—80 per cent of it in Quebec province—to make the event all-Canadian. NEW YORK (AP)—Aluminum Ltd. of Canada said today it will match the half-cent-per-pound price increase for aluminum ingot announced Monday by Reynolds Metals Co. The Canadian firm's decision to increase prices in the United States raised chances that the increase, to 25 cents, will spread through the industry. It would reverse a two-year downturn in ingot prices, but still leave price below last year's 24 cents.

There has been no announcement yet from Aluminum Co. of America, first-ranked U.S. producer, or Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical Corp., the third-ranked producer.

Aluminum Ltd. said here that the price rise on ingots will start Oct. 2 on deliveries to customers in the U.S.

The company said it was studying possible effects of the increase on ingot and semi-fabricated prices in other world markets, but gave no further comment.

American aluminum producers have long tried to rescue themselves from over-production that brought price cutting and profit squeezes. They have steadily expanded markets to the point where their plants are now operating almost at full capacity.

However, European and Japanese producers still have surplus capacity and fear of suddenly increased imports had discouraged American producers from raising ingot prices. Some industry sources had said there would be no price rise until foreign supplies dwindled.

CLUB BANKRUPT
LONDON (AP)—The night club that launched Britain's craze for satirical entertainment has fallen—killed by the commodity it created. "Satirists have become so expensive that only big record companies and TV can afford them," said Nicholas Laird, co-owner of the once popular Establishment Club, in bankruptcy court Monday, a report said the club had lost \$35,985 (\$197,955) in less than three years.
