

Chi-Sox Win Four Straight; Antonelli Wins For Giants

Chicago White Sox ran their winning streak to four and Johnny Antonelli pitched his first victory since being traded to New York Giants in the only two daylight games in the major leagues Tuesday. The only other day game scheduled—Milwaukee at Chicago—was rained out.

In the American League Virgil Trucks pitched the White Sox to a 7-2 decision over Detroit Tigers who now have lost two in a row at home after winning three straight on the road.

The 34-year-old former Tiger star scattered six hits, Nellie Fox led the Chicago 12-hit attack with three safeties and Minnie Minoso hit his second homer of the season. The loser was lefty Ted Gray who lost his first nine games last season.

The Giants whipped Pittsburgh 5-2 in a National League game as Antonelli settled down after a shaky start. He walked six men in the first three innings, none in the last six. Loser Paul Lapalme left after seven innings trailing 3-2 but the Giants unloaded in the eighth with five hits and three runs against rookie Nelson King.

In the night games, Philadelphia Athletics blanked Washington Sen-

son for the Redlegs. Andy Seminick connected for his first.

Joe Nuxhall, stepping in after starter Ken Raffensberger was lifted for a pinch batter in the third inning, was credited with the victory. Rookie Memo Luna was the loser.

Wayne Terwilliger's single with two out in the eighth inning deprived Alex Kellner of a no-hitter as the Athletics blanked Washington.

Kellner, who struck out six and walked three, retired 15 batters in order before Terwilliger got a clean single for the Senators' lone hit.

Murry Dickson cruised to his second win of the season for the Phillies.

The 26-year-old veteran, who came to the Phils from Pittsburgh in a winter deal, held the Dodgers to eight scattered hits, including home runs by Gil Hodges and Pee Wee Reese, both with the bases empty.

Preacher Roe, veteran Dodger southpaw, was chased in the fifth inning after a two-run homer by Del Ennis.

Cincinnati blasted five pitchers for 16 hits, including three home runs, for a victory that kept the Redlegs in a first place national league tie with the Phils.

International Ball League Schedule Opens

The second half—but not necessarily the second division—of the international baseball league gets its season under way tonight after the opening day hoopla at Havana and Richmond.

The two new members of the oldest minor league were welcomed Tuesday with special opening games. Tonight the rest of the clubs get down to the business of playing their 154-game schedules.

The second-day opener pits Ottawa Athletics against Buffalo Bisons at Buffalo, where some 14,000 fans are expected, and Montreal Royals against Syracuse Chiefs before 12,000 at Syracuse.

Rounding out the first full schedule of the season, Toronto again will play at Havana and Rochester at Richmond.

Rochester ruined Richmond's opening game Tuesday when the defending champion Red Wings jumped on relief pitcher Al Epperly for single runs in the eighth and ninth innings for a 4-3 victory over the Virginians.

A crowd of 12,000 gave the Virginians a warm reception for Richmond's first International League game since 1917.



N.H.L. Owners To Accept Original Player Draft

NEW YORK, (CP)—National Hockey League owners meeting here Tuesday decided to accept the proposed player draft plan as originally framed.

President Clarence Campbell was authorized to put the draft into effect in conjunction with three other professional hockey leagues. Campbell was instructed to work out the inter-league arrangements.

The owners announced that the NHL annual meeting will be held June 17 in New York.

Under the draft plan, each NHL club can first name 20 players, including two goalies, to its "protected list." These names must be declared by Aug. 3 of each year. The draft is held the second week in September.

Rotation of the draft is 6-5-6-5-4-3-2-1. The last-place club of the previous season gets first choice, then the fifth place club, then the sixth and fifth again and so on. This rotation continues until each club passes.

If a club has a full protected list of 18 and two drafts another player, it must drop someone from the protected list. A club must keep a drafted player all season unless he is suspended for some breach of club rules. If a player refuses to report to the club drafting him, he may be suspended.

The draft price is \$15,000. Waivers can be asked on non-drafted players. The waiver price is \$7,500. Players under 20 years of age are not subject to the draft.

There is also a NHL draft arrangement with minor pro leagues.

Jack Guest, Jr. Back As Sculler After Illness

TORONTO (CP)—Jack Guest Jr. returns to sculling competition this Saturday after overcoming a spinal ailment that two years ago threatened to ruin a promising future.

The 21-year-old son of Canada's Diamond Sculls winner, Jack Guest Sr., will stroke the University of Pennsylvania's eight at the season's opening meet at Princeton, N. J., between Penn, Princeton and Columbia universities.

Guest Sr. said in an interview Tuesday that his son's back was "holding up well" and by June, at the conclusion of the varsity rowing season, they will decide if Jack is fit enough for the singles.

"He's hoping to be able to do it, but he's been too busy working the eight to try out the singles."

The six-foot 5½-inch sculler was considered Canada's hope in the 1952 Olympics at Helsinki before he was affected by a congenital malformation of one of the lower vertebrae.

He began competitive sculling at the age of 15 and lost only twice in four years. In 1950 he won the Canadian and U. S. scholastic singles, the U. S. singles and the Canadian quarter-mile singles. The following year he won the Canadian singles and suffered his two losses—in the first heat of the Diamond Sculls at Henley, England, and the quarter-mile dash at the Canadian Henley.

This week-end, another Guest takes to the water. Nineteen-year-old Don, as promising a sculler as his older brother and famous father, starts training for doubles and singles competition in the British Empire Games trials at Port Dalhousie, Ont., next July.

The six-foot three-inch, 194-pound Don will train with rowing mate Larry Stephan.

Jack Guest Sr. manager of Canada's rowing section in the games, said he has high hopes for Don and Larry in the BEG competition on the Vedder canal, 50 miles east of Vancouver next August.

"They should have a fair chance of making the games," he said.

However, strong trials competition in the doubles is expected from the Vancouver Rowing Club

U. S. Horse Seen Probably Epsom Derby Favorite

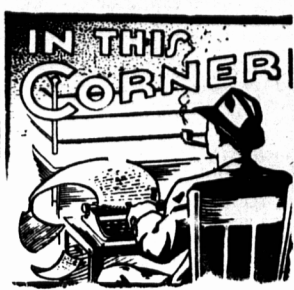
EPSON, England, (AP)—American-owned Amber II emerged Tuesday a probably Epsom Derby favorite by winning the Blue Ribbons Trial Stakes at Epsom.

Bookmakers immediately started revising their Derby lists. Douglas Stuart, a top British bookie, said Amber probably would out Queen Elizabeth's Landau as top choice in the June 2 classic.

Landau was 10-1 in the future book with Amber quoted at 12-1. Odds on Amber are expected to shorten to 8-1 in view of Tuesday's victory.

Amber hauled top weight of 129 pounds and whipped five other starters in the one mile, 110 yards test for three-year-olds. Covering the distance in 1:46 3/5, the finisher had a half-length in front of Just Reward.

Amber II is owned by William Woodward, Jr. He was ridden Tuesday by Bill Carr, the Queen's jockey.



Stevie MacDonald, the holder of the Maritime Amateur Bantamweight boxing championship, plans to put his title on ice again this year if he can ascertain when and where the annual tournament is being held. For the past two years Stevie has solidly trounced every Maritime opponent of note in the bantamweight division at the boxing tournaments at Halifax.

Last year Stevie won the title in such convincing fashion that the promoters were anxious for him to fight in the Featherweight Division.

Unfortunately there are too few Canadian boxing promoters who realize the value of advertising. There are probably only a handful of men in the Maritimes at present who know when the amateur tournament is to be held. Stevie MacDonald, who has won the bantamweight title two years in a row and who is anxious to fight again this year, hasn't been told anything at all about this year's plan. In fact no one in this Province knows for certain if there is to be an amateur Maritime boxing tournament or not.

The case of the Cobey McCloskey-Doug Harper fight for the Canadian Light Heavyweight Boxing championship in another case of poor advertising both by the fight promoters and the Canadian Boxing Federation. All that can be learned here is that the fight is to be held some time this week. The members of McCloskey's own family didn't know the night of the fight when Cobey left Dartmouth for Calgary last week. Its little wonder that boxing is in the doldrums when they don't advertise a Dominion title scrap.

As far as we know here Frank MacDonald, former President of the Islanders Hockey Club, holds the distinction of watching the first spots event on a television set installed on Prince Edward Island. On Saturday night, April 3, Frank watched a wrestling match over His TV set from the Saint John Station. Frank claims that the reception improves as the weather grows warmer. He expects good reception during the summer months, has hopes that the weather may be warm enough next October to see several World Series games.

Joe Richard, the veteran Saint John, New Brunswick long distance runner who has performed here several times during the past three years, finished 38th in the 26 mile Boston Marathon race on Monday. Joe raced here at the Maritime Championship Meet last September and won the six mile road race defeating John Paul, Ev. Cutcliffe and a Navy runner from Halifax. He also won the six miles race at the Dominion Day meet here on July 1.

Whatever chances Gaye Stewart may have had of playing with the Montreal Canadiens next year he lost them Sunday night after the Red Wings won the Stanley Cup from the Canadiens. Stewart became a very central figure in the now-famous failure of the Canadiens to shake hands with the winning Wings following the game. He was quoted as saying that the Canadiens were restrained from shaking hands. We don't believe a word of the statement and have his own word he never said it. However, Dick Irvin had plenty to say about the matter.

The Montreal Star quoted Irvin as follows: "I'm not too sure that Stewart made the remark credited to him but the fact remains that they have been given circulation. Maybe that's why he was on five National Hockey League teams."

In reference to the reported Stewart statement that he should apologize for some of his teammates, Irvin stated "Why should a rookie go around apologizing for team-mates?" Baz O'Meara reports that Irvin was exceedingly mad at Stewart whom he thinks takes defeat too casually.

There was mixed reaction over the Canucks' failure to shake hands with the Wings after the series. General Manager Frank Selke and coach Dick Irvin of the Canadiens made it clear they don't favor handshakes. "Win or lose Dick Irvin doesn't go around shaking hands," says Baz O'Meara. "He doesn't do it, he never did it and he regards such manifestations as sheer hypocrisy." Frank Selke asked "why should players shake hands if they don't feel that way? Why should we go out of our way to congratulate a team that accused us of having one of the referees of the series on our payroll?"

Newsy Lalonde, the fierce hockey and lacrosse competitor of years ago stated "All I can say is this: In all my lacrosse and hockey playing days I never thought about not shaking hands with an opponent after a game, win or lose. I won't say I wasn't a poor loser in my time. Nobody likes to lose; but that never prevented me from shaking hands with an opponent."

Andy O'Brien writes: "Why should they shake hands? A handshake is something to be respected—not given meaningless or hypocritically. You shake hands with a friend, with somebody over whose grief you also grieve, with some friend over whose success you rejoice. Only politicians and Ed Sullivan are tolerated in the meaningless category. There is no ex-
