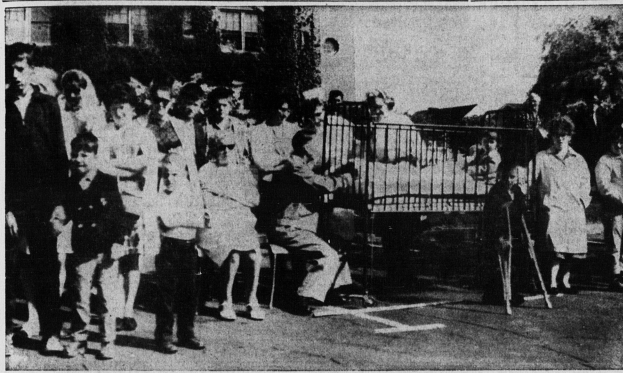




THREE BEAUTIFUL QUEENS PARADE

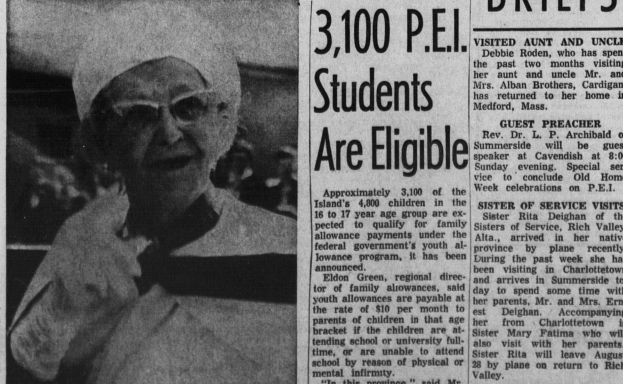
SAN PATIENTS ENJOY PARADE

3,100 P.E.I. Students Are Eligible

Approximately 3,100 of the Island's 4,000 children in the 16 to 17 year age group are expected to qualify for family allowance payments under the federal government's youth allowance program, it has been announced. Eldon Green, regional director of family allowances, said by reason of infancy, said young allowances are payable at the rate of \$10 per month to parents of children in that age bracket if the children are attending school or university full-time, or are unable to attend school by reason of physical or mental infirmity. "In this province," said Mr. Green, "application forms on behalf of 4,000 children in 4,200 families will be mailed Monday. . . . Parents of children who are unable to attend school by reason of infancy may return the filled-out application forms immediately. (Continued from page 1) can nominate Barry Goldwater. Johnson has been weighing three possibilities: Seattle, neither Mississippi delegation, seating both, or seating only delegates who promise to support his ticket.

READY TO SUPPORT

Representatives of at least two Negro organizations are prepared to demonstrate on behalf of Freetown Democrats outside the convention. To bring the Mississippi issue to the convention floor Monday will take a majority vote of eight delegations. The Freedom Democrats say they can count on at least 10 delegations—California, Colorado, the District of Columbia, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Oregon, Washington and Wisconsin.

The Alabama delegation faces a challenge in the credentials committee from Negro lawyer Orrell Billingsley, chairman of the Alabama democratic conference in Birmingham. On grounds it hasn't fulfilled requirements of the Democratic national committee set forth in the call for the convention.

Alabama Democrats have followed the recommendation of Governor George C. Wallace and named a slate of unopposed presidential electors.

The convention call says it is understood that in certifying convention delegates, a state party "thereby undertakes to reassure its voters in the state who will have the opportunity to hear their election ballots for the presidential and vice-presidential nominees selected by said convention."

CIVIL RIGHTS PLANK

The Democratic platform committee ran through final phases of its hearings Friday amid off-stage efforts to head off a civil rights plank that would offend nobody unduly even if it satisfied nobody completely. There was a general feeling that something could be worked out.

The worry over words focused on how far to go, and whether to put the emphasis in recognition of the role of the federal government, on the one hand, in enforcing the new civil rights law, and the role of state and

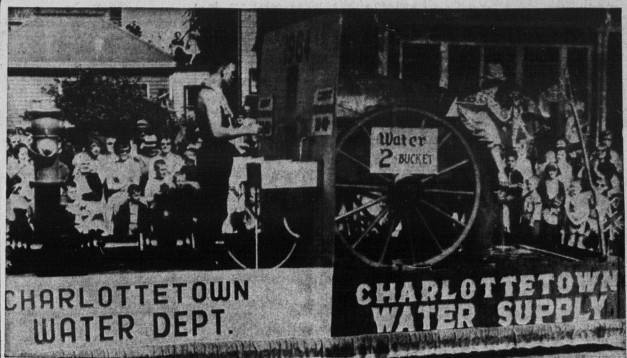

Potato Board Session Views Spud Grading

At the request of a number of potato growers a special meeting of the Board was held Thursday to give consideration to the tightening-up of the potato grade on new potatoes for the first half of September.

The committee, sandwiched between Governor Edmund Peabody of Massachusetts, whose mother went to jail after taking part in civil rights demonstrations in Florida, and Negro Representative Adam Clayton Powell of New York.

In his prepared statement Wallace demanded a plank calling for outright repeal of the civil rights law and hinted at a possible new third-party movement.

He implied he will take leadership in a third-party movement immediately after the presidential election if, as he put it, the Democratic and Republican parties "meet once either through the presidential campaign of this year."

Wallace, who entered presidential primaries in Wisconsin, Indiana and Maryland, and showed surprising strength, released his own delegates after the Republican party nominated Senator Barry Goldwater.

Another fiery issue, the question of re-apportionment of state legislatures to fit population patterns in accordance with a Supreme Court decision, came up in the platform hearings earlier.

Raymond R. Tucker of St. Louis, leader of a contingent of mayors, recommended a plank strongly upholding the Supreme Court ruling—a ruling that has locked Congress in a bitter struggle at all times when it has hoped to adjourn.
