P.E.I. Sealers Working Out Of St. Peters

ST. PETERS — A group of seal hunters from Alberton headed by Glen Matthews has resumed its seal hunting operations from headquarters at St. Peters.

The Alberton group moved its base from North Eastico yesterday morning and is now hunting seals in the large herd about 45 miles off Goose River, which is six miles north of St. Peters.

It is using a light plane piloted by Robert MacIvor of Tryon in getting back and forth to the herd which is estimated to cover about 20 square miles of ice in the gulf. Despite the late start yesterday the group landed 115 pelts, with the plane being able to carry about 15-16 pelts a trip.

Mr. Matthews reported that two sealing vessels are taking pelts in the huge herd and the helicopters used by the Magdalen Island sealers were visible in the distance yesterday.

There are seven others in the party headed by Mr. Matthews.

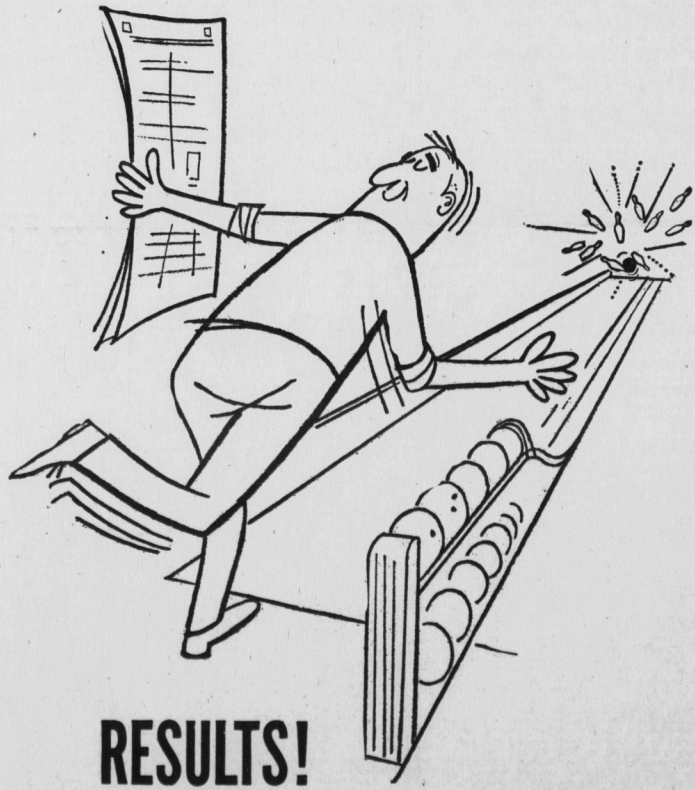
