IN MEMORIAM

JAMES E. MacKINNON

The death in the Prince County Hospital on January 25th of James E. MacKinnon caused widespread sorrow in the Town of Kensington where he had lived most of his life, and where he was respected and esteemed by all his fellow citizens.

James E. MacKinnon was the son of the late Daniel MacKinnon and Annie Lamont of Clermont, and was 57 years of age. He served in World War I in the 8th C.M. B's and Reserve Army in World War II.

In 1919 he joined the service of the C.N.R. at Kensington where he continued to work until ill-health forced him to retire in 1947. After his retirement his health improved and he was able to look after his home until the day of his death when he was stricken with a heart attack. He was rushed to the Prince County Hospital but was found to be beyond medical aid.
