

Dr. Dougan To Attend N.B. Hockey Meeting On Sunday

We have been invited to attend the New Brunswick Hockey League meeting at Amherst on Sunday and I would like to see Halifax as well as myself in the League," stated Dr. F. C. Dougan last night in commenting upon the news story that Halifax is interested in entering a team in the N.B. circuit.

"Halifax has always been a great drawing card in Charlottetown and we have been a great draw in Halifax," continued Dr. Dougan.

The Doctor added that he would not be adverse to Glace Bay being admitted to the League provided that some satisfactory schedule could be worked out to limit the number of trips between Fredericton and Charlottetown teams to Glace Bay and vice versa.

He added however that this was a matter which would be left entirely to the New Brunswick League. "But I would like to see some way in which Glace Bay could be worked into the schedule if they want hockey."

Dr. Dougan stated that some definite decision regarding hockey would have to be reached by Sunday so that the clubs could line-up players.

He stated that Charlottetown would have a coach by Monday of next week if the fans give the go ahead sign to get a hockey team. The drive for funds will open today and will continue until the meeting on Friday night.

Dr. Dougan will attend the New Brunswick Hockey League meeting at Amherst on Sunday.

Halifax Interested In Joining NB Hockey League

HALIFAX (CP)—J. E. (Gee) Ahern Tuesday confirmed reports that a Halifax group is interested in entering a team in the New Brunswick Senior Hockey League.

Ahern, spokesman for the group, said the new club would be called the "Wolverines," a name suggesting back memories for the Halifax alderman who played on an old Halifax team of that name when they won the Canadian title.

He said that Halifax and Charlottetown Islanders are interested in joining some league and are considering seeking admission to the New Brunswick league.

Both were members of the Maritime Major Hockey League last season, along with Glace Bay and

Sydney. But the MMHL has decided not to operate this year.

Ahern said that unless Sydney reverses its present decision not to ice a team this year, or another team takes Sydney's place, an Allan Cup league could not operate. Sydney has until Sept. 20 to make a decision.

He said that considerable travel would be involved if Halifax and Charlottetown joined the New Brunswick circuit, but he thought something could be worked out.

To sound out the idea, Halifax will send a representative to the New Brunswick League's meeting in Moncton this week-end.

Interscholastic Track And Field Meet Sept. 25

The eighth annual Interscholastic Track and Field Championships will be held at Memorial Field, Charlottetown, on Saturday, Sept. 25, 1954, at 2 p.m. sharp.

To compete in the events of this meet, competitors must be entered by schools. No entry will be accepted if the boy or girl is not in regular attendance at school or has reached his or her 17th birthday on the first of September. There will be two types of competition:

Age events for girls and boys

Open events for girls and boys

Entries—Each school is limited to two entries in each event. A contestant can compete only in his or her own age race or open events.

There will be no delays to accommodate entry of competitors. Entries must be in not later than

midnight, Thursday, September 23.

Transportation—In view of the fact that the Department is bearing considerable expense in the purchase of awards, equipment, printing, etc., transportation will be arranged by schools concerned. In other words, the Department will provide no financial assistance for transportation.

Awards—There will be a trophy for the winner of each event. Ribbons will be awarded for second and third places.

Teachers or principals of schools or colleges are requested to note closing date for entries and are urged to select their team and get entries in as early as possible to facilitate meet preparations.

McCluskey To Meet Boston Fighter In 10 Round Bout

Clever Cobby McCluskey (right) has been signed to fight middleweight Johnny MacDonough of Boston in a ten-round bout at the Forum on Monday night, September 27, it was announced last night by fight promoter Ivan Doherty.

McCluskey, in his only appearance here this year, defeated Gary Simon of New Glasgow in a rousing ten round fight.

McCluskey scored a more impressive win over Simon at New Glasgow in a return match three weeks ago. He cut the German above the eye early in the fight and won a unanimous decision over the German-born fighter in his own backyard.

The McCluskey-Simon fight was one of the best to be seen here this season. It was a close affair throughout and one which caused considerable debate over the outcome.

MacDonough is a highly rated middleweight with 19 professional fights under his belt. He is 22 years old.

GLACE BAY, N.S. (CP)—Glace Bay No. 11 Antonians, Nova Scotia junior baseball champions, will meet winners of the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island series for the Maritime title.

Antonians drew an estimated 4,000 fans for their third and deciding game of the Nova Scotia finals against Canning here Sunday.

Canning swamped the Gollery League champions in the first game here but Antonians came through to take two straight, winning the final 9-8 after an uphill fight aided by a Canning defensive collapse.

LONDON (AP)—Charlie Hart, 87-year-old British marathoner who claimed to have run nearly a million miles in his life, died Sunday. He suffered from bronchitis.

A year ago Hart proved he was still young, ran eight miles from Kingston to Twickenham in suburban London in 102 minutes.

In 1928 Hart won a marathon race in Connecticut and later that year he took part in the Los Angeles-New York trans-continental race—a 3,000-mile run.

Giants Edge Milwaukee 2-1; Dodgers Blank Redlegs 4-0

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Giants maintained their 3 1/2 game lead in the National League Tuesday night by defeating the Milwaukee Braves 2-1. They scored the winning run in the eighth inning on three hits and two walks, after Whitey Lockman tied the game with a home run in the eighth inning.

The Giant victory all but spelled doom for any hopes of the Braves might have been entertaining of winning the pennant. The defeat dropped them 5 1/2 games off the pace.

A crowd of 31,331 in the Polo Grounds watched Sal Maglie and young Gene Conley of the Braves hook up in a tense battle for five innings. Each got out of several jams.

But in the sixth, the Braves scored once when Eddie Mathews beat out a slow roller to third base to open the inning, advanced to third on a single by Andy Pafko and tallied when Bobby Thomson's pop fly near the right field foul line dropped in for a single.

Hoyle Wilhelm, the eventual winner, took over in the eighth for the Braves and set the Braves down without a hit.

In the bottom half of the inning, Chet Nichols was called in to replace Conley. He tossed just one pitch to Bobby Hoffman, who pinch hit for Henry Thompson. Hoffman belted it for a single and Don Mueller scored from third.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Cleveland sprinted to within two victories of the American League pennant Tuesday night as the Indians piled up all their runs in the first inning to beat the Washington Nationals 4-2. Mike Garcia, yielding five hits, hurled his 18th victory.

With nine games left to play this season, the Tribe stayed 8 1/2 games ahead of the New York Yankees, who won 11-0 in Detroit.

The Tribe, which finished its season with an 18-4 record against the Nats, registered all its runs in the first inning off southpaw Chuck Stobbs.

Stobbs, who suffered his 11th loss against nine victories, was relieved in the second by young Camilo Pascual, who pitched seven innings of hitless ball, save for a hit in the third. Pascual retired the last 17 batters in order and struck out eight in seven frames.

Al Smith led off the Indians' first inning assault with a double. After Stobbs walked Bob Avila, Wally Westlake singled to left, scoring Smith.

Vic Wertz popped out to Jerry Snyder, then Avila scored on a double by Hank Majeski, with Westlake halting at third. Dave Pope sent a fly ball to Roy Sievers and Hank Majeski tallied on George Strickland's single.

The big inning ended when Jim Hegan flied to Sievers.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Johnny Podres tossed a 3-hitter at Cincinnati Tuesday night, as the Brooklyn Dodgers stayed hot on the heels of the New York Giants by defeating the Redlegs 4-0.

The Dodgers, in winning their sixth straight game, went to work in the first inning for two runs off Art Fowler, the Redleg starter, and chased another pair across the plate.

LUNenburg, N. S. (CP)—Damage to fishing boats and equipment during the week-end hurricane is not believed as heavy as first feared. Lorán Baker, chief supervisor for the fisheries department in the Atlantic region, said Tuesday.

However, Mr. Baker said, he is awaiting reports from inspectors throughout the region before making a complete summary.

James Sinclair, federal fisheries minister here to attend the annual fishermen's exhibition, said "it is not yet certain that damage reached abnormal proportions."
