Passamaquoddy Survey Requested By Maine

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—Maine's congressional delegation asked Congress Friday to vote \$3,000,000 for a survey of how much it would cost to build the Passamaquoddy tidal power project. In announcing the action, Senator Margaret Chase Smith (Rep., Me.) said in a statement that Congress is being asked also to direct the International Joint Commission on the Canadian-United States Boundary Waters to make the survey.

The joint commission was established to survey the proposed tidal power project in Passamaquoddy Bay between Maine and New Brunswick. Its backers say the big project would harness the high tides of the bay and convert the energy into electric power. The project has been talked about a lot in Congress and elsewhere in Washington for at least 20 years but never has been given a final okay.

The first large-scale investigation of the tidal power project was started by Dexter P. Cooper, and interests he represented, in the early 1920's. In 1926 the Federal Power Commission issued a preliminary permit to him for the project. This permit expired in 1928. Cooper made another unsuccessful effort to get going on the project and then the Federal Government took over the proposal.

In 1941 the Power Commission concluded that Passamaquoddy tidal power could not compete successfully with hydroelectric power "potentially available" from rivers in Maine or with power from modern, efficient steam-electric plants.

length, is written by I. Kishinevsky, secretary of the Romanian Workers (Communist) Party, and it leaves little to the imagination with regard to what is going to be thrown at Ana.

The daughter of a pious Jew, Mrs. Pauker renounced her religion and family for the short-lived glory of Communist dictatorship. Her Jewish origin will be against her, as it was against Slansky, in the new anti-semitism sweeping the Soviet satellites under Communist direction.

The Pravda article is entitled "Ideological Work Of The Romanian Workers Party." The article attacks Vasily Luca, onetime finance minister who became trapped in the snare of a monetary reform which led to chaos in Romania.

The article says: "Luca conducted in practice an anti-Leninist line, encouraging capitalist elements in city and village, slowing down the tempo of socialist industrialization of the country, encouraging capitalist trade, and directing co-operation with the line serving the interests of the Kulaks (well-off peasants) and capitalist elements in general."

"With the support of Pauker and Georgescu (another deposed minister) Luca, together with enemy elements whom he brought into the state apparatus, conducted counter-revolutionary activity, directed against the party and the state, with the aim of undermining the peoples democratic structure and sabotaging the building of an economic base of socialism, with the aim of restoring capitalism in our country."

"The decisions of the plenums of the central committee of the Romanian Workers Party, held the first half of this year, armed our party for the struggle against right deviation and as well against the toleration of this dangerous form of masked opportunism."

"The struggle for the full exposure and liquidation of the right deviation and the conciliatory attitude toward it is at present a vital task."

"That should just about take care of Ana."
