

SAYS SORRY IT HAPPENED

Williams Fined \$5,000 For Spitting Gestures

BOSTON (CP) — Boston Red Sox general manager Joe Cronin Tuesday night fined Ted Williams \$5,000 for his spitting gestures in Tuesday's game against New York Yankees.

Cronin took the action an hour and a half after Williams' latest outburst, imposing the fine for what he termed "conduct on the field."

Williams said he was sorry it happened.

"I was sorry the instant I did it," Williams said. "Previously he was silent in the dressing room and had said nothing to the press following the contest."

Williams spit several times earlier this season—once in the presence of major league commissioner Ford Frick.

TOSSED BAT

In addition to the spitting Tuesday, Williams threw his bat 40 feet in the air after drawing a bases-loaded walk in the 11th inning as the Red Sox edged New York 1-0.

Cronin told reporters he assessed the fine after conferring with manager Mike Higgins and talking by telephone with owner Tom Yawkey in New York.

"Mr. Yawkey was listening to the game on the radio and was very upset by Ted's actions," Cronin said. "We couldn't condone such actions," Cronin said. "And it was

While we among other lovers of baseball in and around Charlottetown have been pondering the ills of the game and why the crowds are not turning out as they used to and naming as the villain our benches and sundry other things, it has occurred to us of late that the players themselves may be as much to blame as anyone or anything.

Last year the bickering over balls and strikes and calls on the bases was bad enough this year it has been terrible. We as a sports writer, are perhaps closer to the game than the average fan but we are always in a position to see every game from a spectators viewpoint and must say that most of the games this year have been pretty crummy. On this they are dead wrong. Fans soon get to know them as loud mouths and get pretty bored with it all and eventually begin to stay away from games in droves.
