

To Prevent Bootlegging of Polio Vaccine in Canada

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada has taken steps to prevent bootlegging of the Salk vaccine and to help export of the polio vaccine until the country's needs are met.

Health Minister Martin said in an interview Thursday no time will be lost in getting sufficient production ready for a country-wide mass inoculation program.

"But naturally we are anxious to get Canadian children vaccinated first," he said. "Any supplies that remain we will share with the world."

Present plans call for the inoculation of perhaps 1,000,000 Canadian youngsters this year.

The vaccine will come mainly from the University of Toronto's Connaught Laboratories which has produced doses for about 600,000 children so far.

Another supplier, the University of Montreal's Institute of Microbiology, is expected to start production next September. Two United States commercial drug companies, with Canadian branches, have been licensed to sell the vaccine in Canada.

The U.S., facing a shortage, has limited exports of the vaccine except to Canada.

While Canada has no such firm ban, Mr. Martin said that under Canada-U.S. agreement, any item restricted by the U.S. and shipped to Canada, cannot be exported without a federal licence. No Canadian export licences would be granted.

"No one can tell just when we will be able to export," he added. Canadian supplies, likely will be short of the demand for some months. There are about 5,300,000 children 16 years and under in Canada.

Joint Hospital Commission

Col. J. Laurence Black, Sackville, N. B., Chairman of the Joint Commission currently studying the field of relationship between the Maritime Hospital Association and Maritime Hospital Service Association (Blue Cross), at a meeting of the Joint Commission on April 14th said: "I am confident that the report of the Commission will be ready prior to the annual M. H. A. Convention to be held on May 31st."

Stating that the Commission is making marked progress, Col. Black issued his statement following adjournment of the meeting in Moncton, N. B.

Reverend Sister Paul of the Cross, Superior of Saint Martha's Hospital in Antigonish, N. S., and Dr. Charles I. Gass Talamagouche, N. S., attended the session at Maritime Hospital Association representatives, Dr. William L. Webster, Shediac, N. B., and Dr. Joseph A. MacDougall, Saint John, N. B., who recently became President of the Blue Cross. Blue Shield Board members present at the meeting were Mr. A. and M. H. S. A. representatives for New Brunswick.

Mr. M. A. Farmer of Charlottetown, who since formation of the Commission has acted in the interests of M. H. A., was also in attendance.

Another hospital Commission appointee, is Dr. Leonard L. Miller, St. John's Nfld., who was unable to be present for the meeting.

Mr. W. Walter Dick, C. A., Moncton, N. B., participated in the meeting as Commission Secretary.

The Commission refused to accept the resignation tendered by Dr. J. A. MacDougall, on the grounds that his assistance, to use the words of the Chairman "is invaluable." Dr. MacDougall offered his resignation because he had been elected Chairman of the Blue Cross Board since he was appointed to the Commission and wished to leave the Commission free to replace himself in opinion such action would be indicated.

Col. Black announced that the next Commission meetings have been scheduled for April 23rd and April 25, in Moncton.
