Find Death Accidental

A jury empanelled to inquire into the death of John Francis MacIsaac, 24, whose body was found on the shore near Naufrage on June 3rd, found that the deceased came to his death by accidental drowning.

The inquest was held last evening at the hall at St. Margarets with Dr. M. N. Beck acting as coroner, and Mr. S. S. Hessian appearing for the crown. Ten witnesses were heard, Roddy MacPhee, Basil Chapman, Cpl. L. Strong, Lorne Peters, Ronald MacDonald James Eldershaw, Elmer Gallant, Harry Gallant, John Gallant, Joseph Chapman.

The deceased left Souris May 27 with Mr. Basil Chapman in the early afternoon and drove to Naufrage. MacIsaac got out about one and a half miles from his brother's home. He then went to the village and remained there most of the evening and about 9 p. m. went to the home of James Eldershaw where he remained for some time. Between 10 and 11 p. m. he went to the home of Elmer Gallant which he left shortly after. It was presumed that he went in the direction of the breakwater. His purse was found on the shore near the breakwater, and his jacket was later found near the side of the road.

Installation Being Completed Of Fishmeal Plant At Souris

Installation of the machinery to modernize the plant of the Eastern Fisheries at Souris was expected to be completed yesterday. The machinery is designed for the fish meal plant and test batches have already been run. It is expected that it will be in full operation by June 15.

The cookers installed have a capacity of 15,000 pounds of offal. It takes 10 hours to cook a batch, but the drier it is the quicker it cooks. The cooker is operated by a 75 horsepower diesel engine and attached to a 35 horsepower boiler which is fully automatic and which supplies the steam for the cooker. The offal, the fish residue which is not used for human consumption, is carried to the top of the cooker by a conveyor belt. In emptying the cooker the meal is forced out an end door by paddles which are inside the building and which are inside the building and which the meal is cooked it is put through a large-capacity hammer mill which grinds it to a fine powder which is afterwards put up in 100-pound bags.

The fumes from the cooker are carried off by a 6-inch pipe through a condenser and eventually out to the water in the harbor. At the same time plans have been made for the installation of more cooker machinery if it should be required.

bin had no part in the "improper and inadmissible activities." Panyushkin broke the news about his departure to reporters after a 25-minute call on State Secretary Dean Acheson.

"I am leaving for my homeland in connection with a new appointment," he said through an interpreter.

Panyushkin, frequently a bitter critic of U. S. foreign policy, has represented Russia as ambassador here for nearly 4 1/2 years.

He refused to say anything about what he called his new assignment. He said only that he is leaving the U. S. "forever" and that "I am very happy about it."

Zarubin now is in Russia. He was summoned home from his London post May 28.

No Change In Policy

Informed U. S. officials said the diplomatic shift in their view forecasts no change in Moscow's anti-western policy. They speculated that Panyushkin, who had a reputation as a Far Eastern expert had outlived his usefulness in Washington now that a Japanese peace treaty has been signed by the West and the Far Eastern Commission, set up to guide policies for the occupation of Japan, has been dissolved.
