Forest fires are raging east, west and north of Calais, Me. Timber lands on Little Musquash, Big Lake, Beddington road and in the rear of Squirrel Point are burning fiercely and the fire is spreading rapidly. Calais is surrounded by dense clouds of smoke.

JOHN INGS, Esq., has been appointed by the Local Government a member of the School Board for the City of Charlottetown, vice Hon. John Longworth, Chairman of the Board, retired. W. E. Dawson, Esq., has been appointed Chairman of the Board. The Local Government also reappointed Wm. Wickham a member of the School Board of Summerside.

THE CHOLERA.—A despatch announces that Toulon, France, is in a panic over the appearance there of what appears to be Asiatic Cholera. It was reported on Monday that twenty deaths had occurred. Those attacked were chiefly troops and dock laborers. By way of quieting down the panic, the Ministry of Commerce has issued a notice to the effect that the cholera at Toulon is sporadic, and not Asiatic; that it is due to local infection, and therefore confined to the place of its origin.

JUNE FROSTS.—Reports from New England state that the heavy frost of Saturday night caused some damage to the crops, and that in Norfolk county, Mass., the vegetable crops were seriously injured. There is, however, nothing very remarkable in the New England frost as late as June 14. In 1882 frosts occurred in New England and New York on June 12, in New Hampshire on the 22nd and in Vermont on the 30th, while on the 30th of last June frost was reported from Southwestern New York.

SUDDEN DEATH.—A Fredericton despatch of the 24th says a man named Joseph McGinnis, aged about 60 years, died very suddenly at Oromocto yesterday. He dropped on the road to the Burton Court House, and called to some ladies passing for help. They sought assistance, and on their return the man was dead. An inquest was held by Coroner Clowes, and a verdict returned of death from unknown causes. The deceased was a native of P. E. Island, and had been hired out at farming in Sunbury County for the last two years.
