SAN FRANCISCO, April 26. It is reported that the town of Gualleaville, in Arizona, was burned and completely destroyed on Monday by Indians. Thirty-five white people were killed. The Indians are scattering into small bands and making for the Chiricahua Mountains. Forsythe with his entire command is in pursuit.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 26. Many shops and houses belonging to the Jews were burned last night in the town of Kamenez, the Government of Poldsk. Damage 500,000 roubles.

LONDON, April 26. The Times Berlin despatch says the illness from which General Schobolef is suffering is dangerous.

It is understood Mr. Gladstone will, today, make an important statement in regard to the condition of Ireland on the second reading of Healy's bill for the amendment of the Land Act.

Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the Maritime Provinces.

TORONTO, April 27—10 a. m. Moderate to fresh winds mostly fair to cloudy weather, light rain in southern portion to-night not much change in temperature.
