NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL

RECEPTION OF THE PAPAL ABLGATE

Dobell's Design While in England.

OTTAWA, April 5.—The Papal delegate arrived here on Saturday. Last evening the Basilica was crowded with Mgr. Merry Delval received three addresses one in English, read by Mayor Bingham, for the city; one in French from various societies, and one in Latin from the local clergy.

Some discussion has arisen respecting Hon. Mr. Dobell's mission to England. The fact is that he has gone to consult with Chamberlain and the Imperial Ministry to obtain, if possible, the latter's consent to the proposed contract with the Peterson Company for the Atlantic Service.

FIELDING IN A TIGHT PLACE.

Chickens Coming Home to Roost—What will he say or do about it?

OTTAWA, April 5.—Mr. Gillis, member for Richmond County, will on Tuesday inquire of the Ministry: "Does the despatch in the Halifax Chronicle, December, 1894, represent correctly the utterance of Hon. W. S. Fielding, then Provincial Secretary and Premier of Nova Scotia and now Minister of Finance, who, in company with Hon. L. H. Davies, now Minister of Marine, at a public meeting, at Sydney, on the 10th December, 1894, is reported in said despatch as having stated as follows: "Referring to the coal trade he said the Liberal party would not preach one doctrine in Cape Breton and another in the rest of the Dominion. If the coal business could not be carried on without protection; it is better not to carry it on at all. Protection was not a necessity for its welfare." "If the foregoing despatch is a correct report of Hon. Mr. Fielding's speech at Sydney, will his views as therein expressed be carried into effect as regards the coal industry in the Tariff bill that is to be submitted to us during the present session; if not, in what respect will the industry be treated differing from the views he then expressed?"

RUSSIAN OPINION.

The Obstnacy of Greece Semi-Officially Deplored.

St. PETERSBURG, April 5.—The semi-official Journal de St. Petersburg says that the aggressive, provocative attitude that Greece continues to maintain with such deplorable obstnacy forces the powers, much against their wish, to have recourse to the blockade of the Gulf of Athens. The same paper denounces the retention of Col. Vassos in Crete, and says it refuses to believe it possible that Greece will indulge in such an extraordinary act of folly as a declaration of war would be. Continuing, the Journal says: "In the event of such a thing happening, Greece would undoubtedly be the aggressor. She would also be answerable for and would certainly have to endure the most serious consequences, and she would count on nobody's support."

A MURDERERS DESIGN.

"They Will Never Land Richard Newman in Sydney Alive"

SAN FRANCISCO, April 5.—Butler, alias Newman, Australian murderer, was conveyed to the steamer which sailed last night for Australia. Despite all the precautions of the detectives Butler expects to cheat justice before Sydney is reached. To one of the guards he said: "I will never be hanged. They will never land Richard Newman in Sydney alive."

MARKET REPORTS.

More Life in Cheese—Fair Demands for Hams and Bacon.

The Montreal Gazette of the 1st inst., reports the cheese markets as showing more life in a speculative way and at a basis which hardly agrees with the very bearish circulars that have been sent across the Atlantic. It is understood that two of the leading operators at Montreal have been doing a lot of contracting in the Belleville district for April and part of May make at a range of 9½ to 9¾. This is a pretty good price, being fully 2c. per pound above what prices on the new seasons make opened at last year.

The butter market is rather easier on new creamery under increased receipts, and sales were made to day at 19½ to 20c. The demand for ham- and bacon is fair, but the movement of pork and lard is small and prices are unchanged. We quote:—Canadian pork, \$12 to \$13 per barrel; pure Canadian lard, in pails, at 6c to 6½; and compound refined at 4½ to 5c per lb; hams, 9½ to 11½, and bacon 10½ per lb.

In Chicago pork improved 2½, closing \$8 50 March, \$8 50 April, \$8 5½ May, \$8 6½ July. Lard was easier and closed 2½ lower at \$4 20 March, \$4 20 April, \$4 22½ May, \$4 32½ July, \$4 42½ September. Short ribs closed \$4 65 March, April and May, \$4 67½ July.

The Liverpool provision market was steady. Pork closed 50; lard, 22s 3d; boneless long cut heavy bacon, 27; long cut light, 26; short cut heavy, 25; 6d, and tallow, 18s 6d.

In the Montreal grain market the firm feeling continues in oats and prices have an upward tendency, but no further advance has taken place. There continues to be a good demand and all lots offering meet with a ready sale at 23½ for No 2 white in store.

Not Full Yet.

The world is by no means full up yet. Queensland has still an area of 430,000,000 acres to a population of about 450,000 people. Its government has lately been offering more tempting conditions to settlers, who may now hold ordinary land for 20 years at a rental of threepence per acre, while "scrub land" may be selected in areas up to 10,000 acres and held for 30 years at an average rental per acre of very much less than a penny. This ought to be good news for many struggling for a bare living in the mother country. Of course the climatic conditions in many portions of the colony are trying, but so they are in western Australia, which, at the present time is adding 750 per week to its population, and the revenue of which has been increasing at a rate far outstripping the calculations of its treasurer. But this may be only temporary, and it may be that Queensland will be the home of millions of our fellow countrymen after the golden age in the west of the colonial continent has passed away.—Westminster Gazette.

Ancient Will.

The antiquity of legal methods is curiously illustrated by the recent discovery of the oldest will extant. This unique document was unearthed by Professor Petrie at Kahum, Egypt, and is at least 4,000 years old. In its phraseology the will is singularly modern in form, and it is said that it might be admitted to probate today.

INTERESTING NEWS NOTES SELECTED FOR THE EXAMINER.

It is stated in ministerial circles at Madrid that the proposed reforms in Cuba will be introduced into the administration of the affairs of that island in the month of April.

President Kruger's grandson, an officer of the Government at Krugersdorp, has been suspended from duty for having used insulting language to Queen Victoria, and an enquiry has been ordered in his case.

In consequence of the request of the admirals in Crean waters, it has been decided that a further battalion of six hundred men be forthwith sent to Crete by each power. The Welsh Fusiliers, at Malta, have been ordered to be ready to sail immediately.

Crown Prince Constantine issued the following order to the Greek army on the frontier:—"It has pleased His Majesty King George to entrust me with the high command of the army in Thessaly. In taking up my duties at a critical hour, when great responsibilities are resting upon our Fatherland, I feel convinced that you will all do your duty. Remain faithful to your oaths, and be patient and firm in order to overcome all difficulties. By obedience to the laws and your commander you will show that you possess the discipline which makes the strength and the greatness of armies."

ARE ALL BIGAMISTS.

Interesting Decision Rendered by a Washington Judge.

Judge Keene, of the Superior Court of the State of Washington, has decided that over fifty persons who have secured divorces in that State during the past 33 years, are bigamists. During that time many residents of Eastern States went there for the purpose of securing divorces, and after having obtained the desired decree they have returned to their native State and remarried. In all cases, the court holds, where these second marriages took place within six months after the decree of divorce was obtained, the party marrying is guilty of bigamy. This decision is based upon an interpretation of the law which holds that for a period of six months after a divorce is granted in that State the divorced parties cannot legally marry again.

How to Make Scallop Salad.

A dish of cold scallops, surrounded with tomato jelly, and the whole covered with a well made mayonnaise, is a very delicious and attractive one. The jelly is very simply made. It is merely the juice of a can of tomatoes mixed with boxes of gelatin and made into a firm jelly. The scallops are the most difficult to get right, as it is next to impossible to get the average cook to realize that they require hardly any cooking, one minute being an ample allowance; otherwise they toughen, and a tough, greasy scallop is of all things the most indigestible as well as the most unappetizing. If properly cooked, scallops are delicious, either hot or cold, with a mayonnaise.

To fry scallops for a salad put a tea-spoonful of salt and half as much pepper in half a pint of fine sifted flour, roll the scallops in it and fry in deep boiling lard for a minute only. Put in the refrigerator, and, when quite cold, dish with the jelly and mayonnaise.

How to Make Hollandaise Sauce.

One-half teaspoonful butter, juice of lemon, yolks of 2 eggs, speck cayenne, one-half teaspoonful salt, one-half cupful boiling water. Beat butter to a cream, add yolks one at a time, then the other ingredients. Put bowl in boiling water and beat with egg beater until thick as soft custard.
