MONTAGUE — Sixteen resolutions were approved by 35 members of the Kings County Federation of Agriculture at its annual meeting held in Cardigan on Saturday, Friday night.

Present for the meeting were Hon. A.B. MacRae, minister of agriculture and members of the department.

Mr. MacRae expressed disappointment at the small number present and said that the program seems to take a passive interest in the federation and there should be more interest and much larger membership in the province. "It is your organization," he said, "and you should support it."

He also dealt with the recent turning down of the establishment of a tobacco board for King County. He was asking for more control. He also advised that the resource development program was not successful and persons should be tried on a county basis.

Other matters discussed and briefly outlined by the minister were: farm forum, beef production, pooling of machinery, school, hiring, marketing boards and royal commissions.

He also advised federation members that they should take advantage of the department of agriculture educational program which will be starting shortly. This is to be a farm management course.
