VOTERS

In The Interest Of Clean Elections

READ THIS

The following is an article printed in the Windsor Star, one of Canada's leading newspapers, in its issue of June 8, 1951:

The Progressive Conservative Association of Queen's County, Prince Edward Island, has established a precedent for the conducting of future political campaigns in the Province which could have a great influence in other parts of the Dominion that are striving for cleaner political campaigns and purer politics.

It has been made known through paid advertisements in the daily press of the province that not one cent will be spent by it or by its Federal candidate, Wing Commander J. Angus MacLean, for purposes of bribery or other illegal practices to induce the electorate to support MacLean in the Federal by-election of June 25.

The advertisements startling in their directness of language and evident sincerity, have become the principal topic of conversation on the streets of the capital and in the country centres wherever men stop for a few moments to discuss the crops and other questions of local interest.

"CLEANEST AND PUREST"
Some idea of how corrupt election campaigns had become in the province may be gained from the fact that the majority of people did not take the Conservative announcement seriously at first but thought it was just another "election dodge". They are quickly being disillusioned. The campaign, at least as far as the Conservatives are concerned, is going to be the cleanest and purest ever conducted in the province.

The use of money and rum, in large sums and quantities, for the buying of votes has been a common practice in Prince Edward Island, indulged in by both parties, at least since Confederation. It is a custom which has grown worse and more widespread with each succeeding election so that, among the thoughtless, it has become accepted as something which, if not legal, is nevertheless expected of each candidate and of the party which supports him.

During the Federal campaign of 1949, it has been estimated that at least \$500,000 was spent for bribery and other illegal practices by the two major parties in the province, with the Liberal Party spending about \$3 for every Conservative dollar spent.

In the Provincial general election, held on April 26 last, it is estimated that the Liberal Party spent at least \$50,000 in Charlottetown alone. Rum flowed like water. The Conservatives were not guiltless either, but they lacked the funds which a party in power always possesses, and they did not have unrestricted access to the liquor supplies which are under the control of the Liberal Party through the government.

CANADIAN LEGION RESOLUTION
Significant of the revision of feeling which, in the last two

or three years, has become noticeable among thinking people respecting corrupt political practices in the province, is the resolution passed in 1949 by the Prince Edward Island Command of the Canadian Legion. Following is the text:

"Whereas under the Dominion and Provincial elections Acts it is unlawful to engage in corrupt practices, including the buying and selling of votes and the use of intoxicating liquors for election purposes;

"And whereas the provincial command of the Canadian Legion deplores the increasing disregard of the above legislation and believes that the prevailing indifference of the moral and legal principles involved will inevitably result in the deterioration of our democratic system of government;

"Therefore, be it resolved that the leaders, elected representatives and members of all political parties be urged to publicize and enforce the existing legislation in a sincere effort to halt this dangerous trend and to restrain breaches of the law in future elections."

The Conservatives, however, in their widely-publicized announcement that they intend to make this a clean election, are making no references, direct or indirect, to any former practices indulged in by them or their opponents. Neither are they asking for any moral support from the Canadian Legion, from other service or social organizations, or from the clergy or other interpreters of the public conscience.

DISTINGUISHED VETERAN

Wing Commander MacLean, a veteran of the last war with a most distinguished record and a young man of much ability, indulged in no histrionics on the hustings. In clear-cut, simple language he tells his hearers that democracy's most formidable enemy is already within the gates and that only a return to clean politics can save the nation. He makes it plain that he would sooner be defeated conducting a corruption-free campaign than to be elected by purchased votes. Throughout all his public addresses he plays down rather than stresses the fact that he is a crusader, the first of his kind to appear as a Federal candidate for a major party in the province.

It is going to be interesting to learn what his opponent, Liberal Candidate Cecil Miller, will say about the Wing Commander's stand. But far more important for the possible elimination of political corruption from the province will be the political reaction of the clergy and the various organizations. Most of them have been clamoring for purer politics for a long time. A great many of them will now have the opportunity of deciding whether or not their zeal for political reform is closer to their hearts than their political affiliations. The test of the pudding is in the eating.
