It is hoped the riflemen of those Provinces will be able to see their way clear to come. THE farmers of Sault au Recollet and St. Laurent, Que., are having bad experience with a number of famishing dogs which run through the fields at night, causing havoc among cattle and sheep. Eight cows have been worried to death by these dogs within the last month, and in some portions of the two parishes it has become impossible to allow cattle out. MESSRS. C. E. ROBERTSON and G. A. Sharp have returned from a successful fishing expedition to the Eastward. They had their headquarters at the Sea View House, kept by Mr. B. A. Cox, and made excursions to the streams and ponds of the adjacent country. It is needless to say that they enjoyed the weather and the sport, as well as the oamforts offered by the Sea View. THE Journal doubts the veracity of the statement that an eastern fisherman has taken 98 lobsters from three traps one day's fishing. A correspondent of THE EXAMINER writes: "A fisherman at Boughton Island has taken 41 lobsters from one trap in one night's fishing, and a fisherman at Panmure Island from 140 traps has landed successively, Thursday, June 3rd, 2,200, Friday 2,250, Saturday, 1,980, Monday, 2,520. THE facts in connection with the drowning accident to which reference was made yesterday, are about as follows: Saturday

after noon on Wednesday a son of Mr. A. McLean, of Clyde River, went to the shore for the purpose of watering some cattle. While the animals were quenching their thirst it is supposed the young McLean boarded a small boat and went out into the stream. As the wind was blowing pretty stiffly about the time the accident took place, it is thought the boat was upset, the young man thrown into the stream and drowned, as the boat was noticed floating about during the afternoon. The body was found next day.

Supreme Court, Prince County.

Wimbleton—This Year.

The rifle meeting at Wimbleton this year will possess an additional feature of interest in that there will be present three colonial teams, the Indian and Australian volunteers, as well as those of Canada, sending representatives to participate in the matches. For their benefit arrangements have been set on foot to get up a special competition open only to the colonial forces. Outside the pleasurable feelings caused by meeting those representatives of the volunteer forces of other British possessions, the Canadians will have reason to regard the advent of their new competitors with gratification. Pitted against the pick of the riflemen of the United Kingdom, they were, of course, at a disadvantage. Naturally the largest population would possess the greatest number of good shots, and in matches where the teams were small, their rivals might easily depend on carrying off the trophy. With the Indians or Australians, on the contrary, they will enter the field on more even terms, and should, barring unforeseen conditions, come out victorious. The presence of these additional teams will add new zest to the meeting, and as bringing together in friendly competition representatives of widely separated sections of the empire, will aid in the augmentation of that spirit of brotherhood that has been evinced in an increasing degree of late years. Canadian riflemen, and those who take an interest in their affairs, will hope not only that these new claimants will continue to send teams to the annual meetings at Wimbleton, but that their example may be followed by other colonies as well.

The Fishery Matter

An Arrival at Gloucester.

SCARING THE YANKEES.

GLoucester, Mass., June 12. The fishing schooner Alice C. Jordan arrived at this port to-day, from the Nova Scotia coast, with 250 barrels of mackerel. The Jordan is the first to arrive from that fishing ground this season. Capt. Jordan says that all the mackerel were caught outside the three-mile limit. They are the first here mackerel of any consequence landed this season.

CANSO, June 12.

The fisheries protection cruiser Houlette, which arrived here yesterday, discovered eleven American mackerel schooners and ordered them away. They did not stand up to the order of their going, neither did they stop to discuss three mile limits, headlands, nor anything else, but hoisted their canvases and sailed away as quietly and as speedily as possible and stole some of the Gloucester fishermen on shore, becoming disgusted with the outlook for their season's work, have deserted from their vessels and joined the Nova Scotia fleet.

College Consolidation.

HAMILTON, Ont., June 12. The Presbyterian Assembly, in session here, are discussing the scheme of college consolidation. It is proposed to amalgamate the colleges at Pine Hill, Halifax and Montreal, and to unite the theological departments of Queen's and Knox. The Assembly meets in Winnipeg next year.

The Campaign in Nova Scotia.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 12. The campaign is becoming most exciting, and a great Liberal-Conservative victory is certain. Rousing meetings are being held all over the Province, and the greatest enthusiasm is manifested.

Archbishop Fabre.

QUEBEC, June 12. It is officially announced that Mgr. Fabre has been appointed Archbishop of a diocese, to include the dioceses of Montreal, St. Hyacinthe, Three Rivers and Nicolet.

Relieving the Government.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 12. The City Council has decided upon taking over the Poor Asylum and the Provincial Hospital from the Local Government, and running them as city institutions.

Volcanic Eruptions.

LONDON, June 12. Volcanic eruptions and earthquakes are very prevalent in Australia. Whole villages have been swallowed up and many people killed.

The Belfast Riots.

BELFAST, Ire., June 12. The rioting here is of the most desperate kind. It gives but a faint idea of what, however, may be expected when the opportunity offers.

Ireland's Appeal.

Mr. Gladstone, in closing his last speech on the Home Rule question, said: "Ireland stands at your bar expectant, hopeful, almost suppliant. Her words are words of truth and soberness. (Opposition laughter and Home Rule cheers.) She asks the blessed oblivion of the past. In that oblivion our interest is a deeper interest than hers. Go into the length and breadth of the country, and find it, if you can, a single voice, a single book—find, I would almost say, as much as a single newspaper article in which the conduct of England towards Ireland is anywhere treated except with profound and bitter condemnation. Are these the traditions by which we are exhorted to stand? Oh, they are a sad exception to the glory of the country! (Cheers.) They are more than a black blot upon the pages of its history, and what we want to do is to stand by the traditions of which we are heirs in all matters except our relations with Ireland, and to make our relations with Ireland conform to the other relations of our country. (Cheers.) So we reiterate our traditions. So we halld the demand of Ireland for what I call the blessed oblivion of the past. She asked also a boon for the future, and that boon for the future, unless we are much mistaken, will be a boon to us in respect to honor no less than a boon to her in respect to happiness, prosperity and peace. (Cheers.) Think, I beseech you, think well, think wisely, think, not for the moment, but for the years that are to come, before you reject your plan." (Loud and enthusiastic cheering, during which Mr. Gladstone resumed his seat.)
