THE MAILS, AGAIN!

A correspondent directs attention to the fact that all our mails from Western Canada and the United States are now stopped on the mainland for twenty-four hours. We are glad that the people show interest in this matter. It is their business that is delayed. There is no upon the continent of North America another case in which, with plenty of mail steamers—some of them laid up at the wharf—the mails are held in passage for a whole day and night.

THE UNITED STATES AND RECIPROACITY

The treaties of reciprocity entered into by the Government of the United States, within the past year, have been submitted to Congress.

The treaty with Great Britain refers to the colonies and dependencies of Jamaica, Bermuda, Barbadoes, British Guiana, Turk's Island and Garoos Island. Between all of these and the United States there is to be reciprocity of trade for a period of five years—that is to say, unless the Senate should veto the treaties.

It is notable that Canada, the ruling party of which made reciprocity with the United States a leading feature of their pre-election campaign, is not to have reciprocity, or any privilege whatever in the 60,000,000 market.

This is another matter about which the people were fooled and disappointed by the Liberal leaders.

"A BASCALLY RUSE"

A short time ago it was stated that the contract for grading the first eleven-and-a-half miles of the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway was to be completed on or before the 30th of June next. We supposed that this was a clerical or a typographical error, and the point was not noted. But the statement having been repeated on the street, THE EXAMINER caused enquiries to be made at the railway office to find that there was no error in respect to it—that the statement was a true one.

What does it mean?
 The tenders will not be in until the 18th of December, and, having regard for the holiday season, cannot be decided upon before the 8th or 10th of January. Railway grading cannot be done in this Province in January or February, or March, or April. Not before the 1st of May can the contractor begin work; and the work is to be completed before the 30th of June!

There are two conclusions to be drawn. The Government has some favored partisan to whom the contract will be let and for whom the time for completing it will subsequently be extended; or else the letting of the contract, at this juncture, is merely a hoax to be played off on the electors of Belfast and Murray Harbor.

—According to despatches from Ladysmith excursions are running weekly from Pretoria, bringing numbers of gaily-attired Dutch women, who take up points of advantage on the hills and closely scan the proceedings in the town.

AN OFFICIAL REMOVED.

Officials Must Not Use Disloyal Language.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—The Earl of Dunraven, lord lieutenant of Limerick, acting under instructions from Dublin Castle, has removed from the office of deputy lieutenant of the county, Baron Emly, who was recently removed from his position as magistrate by Lord Ashburn, lord chancellor of Ireland, because of his anti-British comments on the war in South Africa.

AT THE BAYONET'S POINT

LONDON, Dec. 11.—The correspondent of the Daily News at Ladysmith, describing General Hunter's capture of the guns on Goo Hill, says:—

"Major Henderson with fourteen guides, who was directing the movements, led the file up the precipitous boulder strewn heights. When nearly half way up the difficult ascent a Boer outpost, apparently just awake, challenged the British. Receiving no answer, they called to their comrades above: 'The English are on us, shoot!' They then fired their rifles, and the explosive bullets flashed as they struck the rocks. A hurried fusillade from the crest of the hill was answered by a single volley. Then our troops raised ringing cheers, apparently doubting their number by the repetition of the sound. Gen. Hunter leading his officers took up the command and ordered the men to fix their bayonets. They climbed like lizards over the huge boulders in an irregular but orderly manner. When they gained the crest they found the Boers in full retreat.

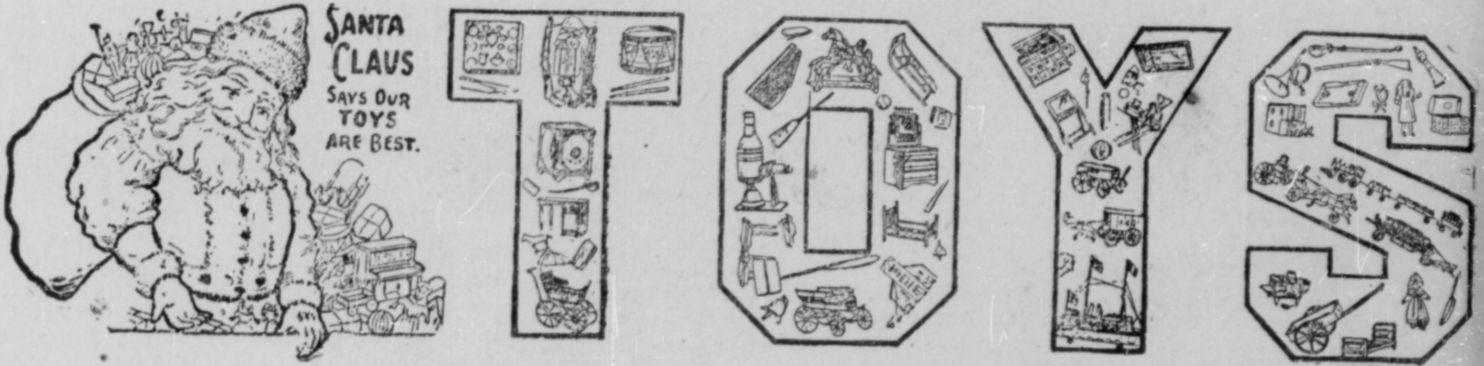

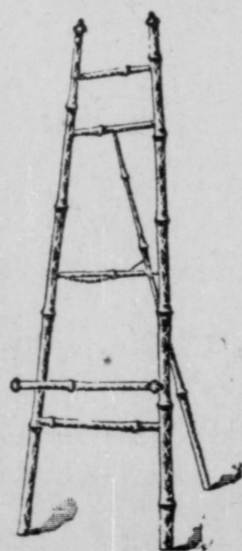
