A few days ago the schooner "City Point," from New London, P. E. I., came to anchor in the lee of East Point, P. E. I. Through the night she parted her cable and drifted towards Cape Breton shore. After much difficulty sail was got on the vessel and she was put into Georgetown harbor with crew badly frozen.

MR. O'CONNOR POWER, M. P., discusses, in the new number of the *Nineteenth Century*, the Irish land question. He has given us an authoritative statement of what the Irish Land League really proposes. Its object is to convert the whole of the Irish tenants into holders in fee simple by buying out the landlords. Mr. O'Conner Power estimates the cost of this operation at £250,000,000.

A "ST. PAUL'S CHURCH ASSOCIATION" has been organized for mutual improvement and instruction connected therewith. Free lectures will be given in the school room fortnightly. The first subject on the programme, for next Tuesday evening, is "The Church as Evidenced by the New Testament." Rev. A. Osborne will open the subject. Capt. Maxwell, R. N., will occupy the chair. GEORGETOWN ROYALTY SCHOOL.—The half-yearly examination of this new and prosperous school was held on Wednesday, 31st December. The *Advertiser* says: The attendance since its commencement has been large, and the progress made by the pupils in the various branches most satisfactory, proving, not only that Miss Kate Cain is a very capable teacher, but that the young people under care have the ability and spirit to make use of their privileges.

SUDDEN DEATH.—On the morning of the 8th inst., Alfred McKenna died very suddenly at the residence of Thomas Foley, Esq., on Malpeque Road. The deceased performed household work at Mr. Foley's, and on Thursday morning was, as usual, in attendance. After lighting two fires he complained of being weak and lay down to rest upon a lounge. Showing no signs of recovering, his mother was sent for. She arrived, and two hours later he expired. Heart disease was doubtless the cause, as the deceased before death complained of pains in his left breast. He was the oldest son of Mr. J. B. McKenna, Revenue Office, and was about 30 years of age. He was a person of good character and respected for his amiable disposition by all who knew him.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

European and American News.

Special dispatch to *Examiner*.

BERLIN, Jan. 8.

Russia has asked Prussia to return the thirty-six deserters from the Russian army, who fled into Germany. But no steps have been taken to comply with the request. Private advices from Cannes report the Czarine's condition as almost hopeless.

PARIS, Jan. 8.

It is stated in medical circles that the health of the Queen of Spain has received a severe shock, owing to the attempted assassination of the King. She has been attacked with epileptic fits to which she was not previously subject.

The subscription for the memorial to the late Prince Imperial amounts to 200,000 francs. The committee propose to erect a Chapel on an elevated point between the Arc De Triumph and the Hotel Des Invalids.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.

A cable special says that the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland was received in dogged silence by the people on his visit to Killarney, and also at Queenstown, when returning to Dublin.

LAHORE, Jan. 7.

A flying column of 1,000 men has been formed for service in the Khyber Pass.

LONDON, Jan. 7.

A Cabul despatch says that before the evacuation of Cabul, Mohamad Jan wrote to Gen. Roberts that, although for the present retiring, the Afghans would not cease hostilities until the English were driven from Afghanistan.

BERLIN, Jan. 7.

There is a belief that Count de St. Vallier will remain here some time longer. The German Government, through its ambassador at London, Count Hohenlohe, has declared the high value set upon his remaining here. In consequence of this action, negotiations of a very serious kind were opened between De Freycinet and Prince Hohenlohe, through which St. Vallier is said to have been persuaded to remain at Berlin.

VIENNA, Jan. 7.

The *Novor Vinya* announces that Prince Lieven has been appointed Minister of Crown Lands, to succeed Waluyeff.

BERLIN, Jan. 7.

Further arrests of officers charged with Nihilism have been made in St. Petersburg and various parts of the Provinces.

The Czar has summoned Prince Donkoff Korsakoff to St. Petersburg, to discuss the threatening condition of affairs in Bulgaria. It is considered that a modification of the Bulgarian constitution is absolutely necessary.
