The British Artillery team are to be banqueted at Montreal. They sail from England on the 21st August. The Queen contributes \$100 to be competed for as a Queen's Prize.

The Weather. The month of July just past is remarkable for its great humidity, rain having fallen in measurable quantities on 20 days. The total rain fall is a very little less than nine inches (precisely 8.972 inches.) The average rain fall for July, during ten years previous to the year 1884, is 3.517 inches, the least fall during the same period being 2.786 inches in 1874, and the greatest 4.223 inches in 1883.

The temperature of the month has also been much below the average, viz.: 60.48, while the mean of July for the ten years previously is 63.87, the lowest mean during that period being 60.98 in 1879 (just half a degree warmer than last month), and the highest, 66.92, in the year 1880.

TELEGRAMS. [SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

Bongola Tranquil.

LONDON, July 31. The "Times" says it has received from Alexandria the following translation of an Arabic telegram, dated Dongola, July 25: "The Mudir with two battalions of Bashi Bazouks, a detachment of mounted infantry, some guns and 4,000 Arab volunteers attacked and defeated a rebel Sherik named Ahmet El Doda, who was entrenched in the Ambukol district among the ruins in the mountains. The rebels were driven completely out of the province and Dongola is tranquil. A messenger from Gen. Gordon has arrived with a letter for Mudir, and is waiting a reply.

The Egyptian Conference. LONDON, July 31. The Egyptian Conference met at the Foreign Office to-day. There was no hitch in the progress of discussion to-day, and it is thought probable that an arrangement will soon be agreed upon. The Conference adjourned, to reassemble on Saturday.

In the Lords to-day Earl Granville said, regarding the Egyptian Conference, that the French Ambassador has not yet received instructions from his Government.

The Cholera.

PARIS, July 31. There were three deaths at Marseilles, and three deaths at Toulon last night from Cholera.

ROME, July 31. Six thousand persons are now detained in various lazarettos on the frontier and along the coast.

LISBON, July 31. The port of Huelva in Spain, has been declared to be infected with cholera. The ports between Cadiz and Arjamente, both inclusive, are also suspected of being infected.

H. M. Stanley.

LONDON, July 31. Henry M. Stanley has gone to Ostend to meet King Leopold, of Belgium, and the directors of the African International Association. Mr. Stanley denies that any discord exists between him and the directors, who, he says, have assembled at Ostend specially to accord him a warm welcome.

A Friend to the Wesleyan Conference.

LONDON, July 31. The Wesleyan Conference has been presented with a theological library of 30,000 volumes, by an unknown donor.

Arrest of a Grenadier.

A private of the Grenadier Guards, named O'Jell, has been arrested and taken to Dublin on a charge of being implicated in the abominable Cornwall scandal.

A Treaty of Peace.

SHANGHAI, July 31. It is reported here to-day that France and China have made a treaty of peace. China is to pay France an indemnity of \$7,280,000.
