THE attempts to tow the bark Ralph B. Peake from her position on Governor's Island Saturday and yesterday were unsuccessful.

It is said that the Duke of Leinster has arranged to sell to his tenants a large portion of his Kildare estates on an 18 years' purchase plan.

THE inciters of the recent Socialist riots in Chicago, have all been found guilty of murder and with one exception sentenced to be hanged.

THE cook of a schooner lying at Pownal Wharf had his finger broken this afternoon while closing the hatch. He was taken to the City Hospital.

THE Salvation Army left this forenoon on a brief visit to Summerside. While waiting for the train to start the Hindus offered up prayers for some of the railway officials.

THE enterprise of Messrs. Stanley Bros. and G. H. Hazard, in placing an electric lamp in front of their place of business, in the Brown Block, is greatly to be commended.

AT the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, two drunks were sentenced to \$20 or thirty days each; a Scott Act prosecution fell through, and a nuisance case was postponed.

AS an indication of the growing popularity of the self-inder it may be mentioned that on Saturday afternoon five were noticed at work, within eight miles of Charlottetown, on the St. Peter's Road.

THE Island delegates to the Oddfellows' Convention at Woodstock, N. B., returned home on Saturday evening. They speak highly of the manner in which they were treated by the Woodstock Brethren.

SEVERAL Hindu and French members of the Salvation Army arrived in the city on Saturday evening, and assisted at the Army meetings same evening and yesterday. The Hindus are in native costume and excite much curiosity.

THE young man Miller, accused of stealing jewelry and other articles from the Dominion House, and the Elton House, was captured in Georgetown on Saturday and brought to town same evening. He is at present a lodger at the Government Boarding House.

A CABLEGRAM from London announces that the Earl of Clanwilliam, who has been in command of the North American squadron, for about a year, in succession to Admiral Comberell, will shortly leave his post, and that Vice-Admiral Lyons will take his place.

WE regret to learn that a little three year old boy, son of Mr. Andrews, who lives near Elliot Station, had his arm cut off and his body so badly mangled by being caught in a reaping machine on Saturday afternoon, that he died before the arrival of a doctor, who was summoned as soon as the accident occurred.

WHILE in Halifax recently, Mr. John Joy purchased a handsome four-oared shell, from the Halifax Boating Club, for the South-end Boating Club of this city. The shell was built in New York, a few years ago, for the Ross-Peley crew. It arrived here in the M. A. Starr, on Friday, and the crew who are practicing in her are well pleased with the purchase.

PEOPLE doing business in the neighborhood of Queen Square are long in their complaints against those who are responsible for keeping that portion of the Square occupied by the new Post Office Building closed up. Now that the building is almost ready for occupation, there is no further necessity for the yard room, and we trust that it will be opened up immediately.

SEVERAL masked men entered the farm house of John Wright, at Barber Settlement, Me., on the night of the 19th, presented revolvers at the heads of Mr. and Mrs. Wright and demanded Wright's money. The farmer, thoroughly frightened, complied with their demands, and paid over his entire savings for years, more than one thousand dollars in American and English gold. The burglars escaped with their booty. There is no definite clue, but it is strongly thought they were not strangers.

AN Alberton correspondent says:—A few days ago John McCaull, the Government prosecutor under the Scott Act, paid a visit to Tignish, the result of which was that on the 18th inst., Isidore Chaisson, Christopher M. Callaghan, and James McFadden were brought before John T. Weeks and Henry Gordon, J. P.'s, and fined each \$50 or two months' imprisonment; and on the 19th inst., Graham Thomas, of Brae, was taken before the same Justices and fined \$50. Mr. McCaull is evidently the right man in the right place.

THE Nick Roberts Gardner Circus is exhibiting in Souris to-day, and will be in this city, on the Jail Square, for two days, commencing to-morrow. The Fall River (Mass.) Globe of May 21, says: "The Nick Roberts Gardner circus tent was crowded to the ring bank last night. The sale of seats was stopped at 7:30 p. m., the demand being greater than the supply. A double bare-back act by Ed. Shrop and Mile Marie, and the great leaping act by the champions, led by Mr. Frank A. Gardner, who executed a double somersault over 17 horses, surrounded by a five line pyramid, are great features.

Baptists in Convention. St. JOHN, N. B., Aug. 23. The forty-first Annual Session of the Baptist Church of the Maritime Provinces opened here on Saturday morning. About 250 delegates were in attendance. The nominating committee reported the following for officers: President, B. H. Eaton, of Halifax, N. S.; Vice-Presidents, H. C. Creed, of Fredericton, N. B.; and the Rev. A. H. Lavers, of North River, P. E. I.; Secretary, Rev. Prof. Kierstead; Asst. Secretary, Rev. W. F. Parker, of Woodstock, N. B.; Treasurer, F. S. Simms, of St. John, N. B. The report was adopted by the Convention. Before leaving the chair, the retiring president, Mr. Simpson, read an address on the "Duties of a Church towards its Pastor." The Woman's Baptist Missionary Union also met and elected as officers, Mrs. M. Williams, President; Mrs. Lavers, Vice-President for P. E. I. and transacted some further business.

To Contest a Will. HALIFAX, Aug. 23. Proceedings have been commenced in the Probate Court of Nova Scotia to upset the will of the late Alexander McLeod, of this city. The action is taken in the name of his brother, Archibald McLeod, of Blackness, Scotland, his only surviving relative. The petition for probate of the will of the late Alexander McLeod was filed in due and solemn form on the 26th July last, and was contested on the ground that the testator was not of sound mind at the time of making the will, and that he was unduly influenced to dispose of his property in the manner he did. The estate was proved at \$231,000, the residue of which—after making a number of legacies and bequests to private individuals and religious and charitable institutions—was left to Dalhousie College. That residue is estimated to be about \$70,000.
