The Australian Banks.

(The Empire.)

Financial affairs in Australia seem to be getting worse instead of better. Banks are going down almost daily, while the one-time heavy export of gold from the Colonies is being strangely reversed; our cables of yesterday announcing a considerable import from London. No doubt this drain upon London banks, and the depletion of deposits in the great agencies of Australian banks the Imperial capital is reacting upon the American situation.

The Banks of Australasia at the beginning of the current year numbered twenty-six, many of them with agencies in London and all over the world, together with an immense number of branches throughout Victoria, Tasmania, New Zealand, New South Wales, etc. Within a few months six of them have failed, with the following amount of deposits:

Out of this total of deposits, over \$80,000,000 was British money placed in the hands of London agents of the banks at high rates of interest during the boom. It is hard to say now when the troubles will cease. One failure naturally brings another, and each crash increases the distrust of depositors and accelerates the withdrawal of money which in turn precipitates some further disaster. There were on January 1 of this year \$774,000,000 worth of deposits in the banks of the Australian system, over \$200,000,000 of which was from British depositors. Since then \$200,000,000 have been abstracted by failures, and how much more by the drain still going on it is impossible even to estimate.

How much better it would have been if some at least of this bountiful contribution of the Australian and British public to a "period of boom" had been placed in stable and substantial investments such as Canada offers in endless variety.

Cuban Revolution Begun.

GENERAL UPRISING REPORTED ALL OVER THE ISLAND.

Cuba is again in the throes of a revolution. A general uprising has taken place throughout the eastern portion of that island.

The movement, which has been kept from the public by the authorities, was started near Holguin on the 24th April, when two brothers named Sartorius raised the war cry, and, with twenty followers, marched out of a little town named Purvio, being reinforced on the following day by eighty men from the town of Velasco.

Reports of uprisings throughout the districts of Manzanillo, Holguin, Guantanamo, and Tampa, are being received.

The Captain General called a council of war on the night of April 27, and shortly after issued an order declaring the province of Santiago de Cuba in a state of siege, and orders have since been issued detaching troops at every available point, which are being sent eastward to check the uprising now becoming general, apparently in keeping with the previous arrangements of leaders throughout Havana, Matanzas, and the neighboring cities.

Regular troops are marching through the streets and drilling constantly at Havana. The militia is being pressed into service, and extra guards are placed on all public buildings.

The steamer Villaverde has been despatched with a battalion of the Zaragoza regiment for Navatia.

A company of guerrillas who have been following bands in the vicinity of Havana, has been ordered to Manzanillo, and the cutter Mellanches will sail from Santiago de Cuba for Gibara, on the north coast, where she will remain to intercept the landing of filibustering expeditions.

The situation is considered serious by the authorities, and the press and all the available force of the government is being concentrated in the Yuelta Ariba district.

Couldn't Barter Her Child.

A JUDGE REVERSES A VERDICT A MOTHER HAD RECEIVED FOR \$20,000.

Twenty years ago Dr. William J. Enders, of Philadelphia, who then was three years old, was placed in the care of his grandfather. The grandfather agreed to rear and educate him, and at the expiration of twenty years to pay to his mother \$20,000 for giving up the child to him. The boy's father and mother had separated and the grandfather wanted charge of the child. He was educated as a physician, practicing in Harrisburg a short time with his grandfather, and then removing to Philadelphia. The grandfather soon died, leaving an estate valued at \$100,000, half of which he bequeathed to his widow and the remainder to his grandson, who was named as one of the executors of the will. When the twenty years had expired the mother of the boy demanded of the executors the fulfilment of the contract, but they refused, and she entered suit to recover the \$20,000. On the trial the jury found in her favor for the full amount. Judge Sissington handed down an opinion on Monday setting aside the verdict and giving judgment for the executors, on the ground that the contract was against public policy, inasmuch as the relation of parent and child constitute and obligation which the parent cannot barter away for profit. It is said to be the first case of the kind ever decided in that state.
