HON. D. DAVIES has received a telegram from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries announcing that it has been arranged to extend the time for the lobster fishing, in the Gulf, until the first of September.

THE BOYS who committed the robbery at Mr. Holland's yesterday, entered the residence of Mr. James Warburton and stole therefrom a pair of skating boots. At the time the young thieves committed this larceny the police were pursuing them.

THE Oddfellows' entertainment Committee are having the ceiling and walls of the Market Hall nicely tinted, and the interior thoroughly cleansed. The building needed this very much, and the present improvement will, we doubt not, be appreciated by the large audience who will attend the Oddfellows' entertainment on Monday evening next.

CAPTAIN MORAN, of the schooner *Foam*, met with a serious accident on board his vessel at Peake's No. 2 Wharf this morning. While in the hold a hatch which was suspended over the hatch-way fell and struck him on the forehead, inflicting a terrible gash immediately above the eyes. He was removed to his home where he now lies in a very precarious condition.

LET a publisher be never so careful, mistakes will sometimes appear in a daily paper; and critics may occasionally be justified in taking advantage of them. We think, however that the Rev. Mr. Osborne was hardly generous to his opponent when he endeavored to place Dr. McDonald at a disadvantage on account of the insertion of a comma between the words "Optatus," and "Milevitanus," as they appeared in the learned doctor's first letter. On reference to the MSS. of that letter, we find that the insertion of the comma was merely a typographical error. In it the words "Optatus Milevitanus" read as they should read without any mark between them. Dr. McDonald did not see a "proof," or his quick eye would, we doubt not, have readily detected the mistake. It is not probable that the Very Rev. gentleman himself would go the trouble of explaining a thing for which he is not responsible; and now that the controversy is closed by us, we consider it but right to make this explanation, which, indeed, is justly due to the high esteem in which we, in common with the whole community (Protestant and Catholic), hold the Very Rev. Doctor. An error in the letter of the Rev. Mr. Osborne has also been brought to our notice. In the extract, "the days of Salathiel," etc., instead of the "seventeenth," read "even to the seventeenth year," etc. We may remark that additional correspondence on this subject has been pressed upon us; but it is not probable that, if we admitted it, the discussion could be stopped with such fairness to all the disputants as at the present time.
