

Nuclear Arms For Canada
Deported By Macquarrie

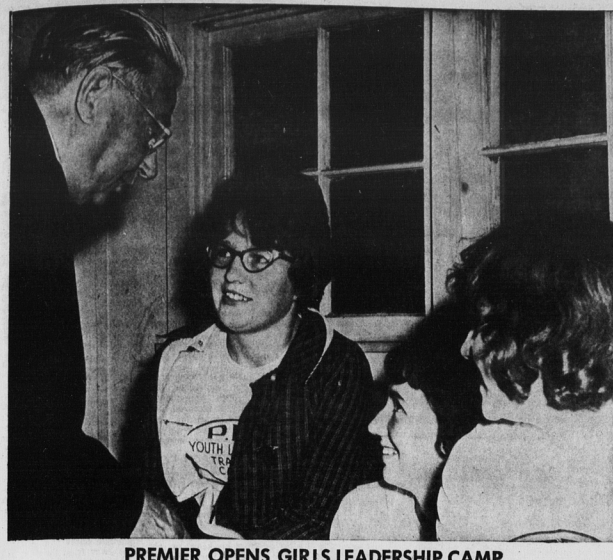
The seemingly controversial actions of the Canadian Government in endorsing the recent nuclear test ban treaty and then equipping its armed forces with nuclear arms has brought sharp criticism from Health Minister, Mr. Macquarrie said he was surprised and expressed regret at the recent action of the "Pearson government" in equipping its Canadian forces with nuclear arms.

"Relations between the U.S. and the U.S.A. are at a new and possibly hopeful stage, while relations of the two great powers of the commonwealth are at a crucial stage. In the midst of such a situation, Canada might more usefully have refrained from becoming a nuclear-equipped power."

Early Start Is Planned On City Incinerator Project

Construction will get underway immediately on a "teepee" type incinerator for the City of Charlottetown. The contract was awarded to A.S. Engineering, an emergency, was awarded the contract at a recent meeting of the Council yesterday. The cost will be \$36,371. The contract for the incinerator was awarded Donald A. MacPherson, Charlottetown, and will cost \$6,566. It is expected the project will be completed in about eight to 10 weeks. In that time, the Public Property Committee, under the chairmanship of Arthur Gormley is expected to arrive at a decision as to whether the compulsory collection of garbage should be adopted. Mayor A. Walten Gaudet suggested the committee might be prepared to present their plan to the council within six to eight weeks. The incinerator will be built on a section of land at the eastern end of Falconwood Farm owned by the Provincial Government. This land will be deeded to the City. The Government has also undertaken to provide a paved right-of-way. No mention has been made as yet regarding a contract for the compulsory collection of garbage. This matter is still under study by the Public Property Committee.
