New Jailor Assumes Duties

Aenes D. MacEachern yesterday assumed his duties as jailor of the Queen's County Jail, a position to which he was appointed July 16. Prior to his appointment Mr. MacEachern was the caretaker of the Court House, Charlottetown, a position which he held for more than twenty-five years.

During the past few weeks the jail has been cleaned, fumigated, and generally repaired, including the installation of new locks of the hasp and bolt type on each of the cells. The jailor will thus be enabled to maintain control over all inmates, without danger of the prisoners turning the locks. When not in use the locks will be retained in the jailors office. The remodeling of the jail is expected to be completed and the building ready for occupancy early next week. At present the floors of the office and corridors are being resurfaced. The prisoners are being housed in Summerside and in the City Police cells.

ACTIVE POWDER

This freeze method destroys the whole platelets, but the powder still contains the active ingredient to stop bleeding. Exposure to atomic rays—accidents may happen in the expanding atomic age—can kill by making you a set-up for infections or hemorrhages. Antibiotics can stop infections. The shots of platelets can stop bleeding by repairing leaks in tiny blood vessels. These shots have almost instantly stopped bleeding caused by leukemia, a cancer of the blood, Dr. Klein reported. They win time to try to stop the leukemia through drugs or other treatments.

Clamp Tight Restrictions On Cyprus Church Leader

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — British authorities clamped rigid restrictions on the bishop who assumed the mantle of Greek Cypriot leader with the exile of Archbishop Makarios. British authorities issued an order confining the Greek Orthodox Bishop of Kitium to his official residence in Lanarca, on the southeast coast. They charged he had supported EOKA, the terrorist underground. Police will screen all visitors to the religious and political leader of 400,000 Greek Cypriots and scrutinize his correspondence. A communique said the crackdown is designed to keep Bishop Anthimos from resuming contacts with the EOKA and from carrying on political propaganda.

der spread through this capital, a Briton was shot in the arm while writing on a Nicosia street. EOKA, officially the national organization of Cypriot fighters, has carried on a 16-month shooting and bombing campaign. Leaders of the 100,000 or so Turkish-speaking Cypriots oppose this campaign, insisting that the island remain British or go to Turkey. Britain last march exiled Archbishop Makarios to the Seychelles Islands in the Indian Ocean on grounds he was involved in EOKA's violence. The Bishop of Kitium has been heading the Greek community in his absence. MAY BE DEPORTED. Greek sources interpreted the last paragraph of the official statement accompanying the confinement order as a prelude to "stronger action" — such as deportation — against Bishop Anthimos. The last paragraph of the British statement said: "These arrangements may be reviewed later if further informa-

tion regarding the Bishop of Kitium's part in the EOKA conspiracy becomes available, or if there is a renewed outbreak of violence." The British military governor, Field Marshal Sir John Harding, said the restriction order was issued because of "clear evidence" he had helped EOKA. Harding declared such evidence was found in the diary of Col. George Grivas, who the British say heads EOKA under the alias of Diphignis. In Athens three Greeks said the diary was a forgery. They were George Gazouleas, once an aide to Grivas, and two brothers, Constantine and Michael Estato-poulos, Athens lawyers. The three told reporters British agents four months ago offered them \$140,000 for samples of Grivas' handwriting. They said they turned down the offer. Gazouleas was named in the diary as receiving munitions money for EOKA.

Blood Banks Now For Atomic Age Requirements

By ALTON L. BLAKESLEE. BOSTON (AP) — Potent new life-saving blood banks for the atomic age were announced today. These banks stockpile a magical element in human blood which works almost instantly to stop bleeding caused by exposure to atomic rays, by leukemia, and in other diseases and conditions. This natural blood element is called platelets, one of the three types of blood cells. Red cells carry oxygen. White cells fight infection. The platelets help control bleeding or hemorrhage. Each platelet is only a millionth of an inch wide.

lets die too fast. The platelets in a pint of blood die within a day after blood is donated to a bank. But the platelets now can be fished out of whole blood and preserved separately. One method is to quick-freeze and dry them into a white powder, kept in a sealed glass tube and then mixed with salt solution when a life-saving injection is needed. This method was reported by Drs. Edmund Klein, Sidney Far-

A method of preserving precious platelets perhaps indefinitely was reported to the sixth congress of the International Hematology Society.

Persecution Decried By Baptist Federation

WOLFFVILLE, N.S. (CP)—The Baptist Federation of Canada Tuesday described persecution of protestants in Colombia and approved resolutions condemning lotteries and any move to appoint a Canadian ambassador to the Vatican. "The federation asked for an investigation by the Canadian Council of Churches into charges that protestants are persecuted in the Latin American country. Delegates also urged the Canadian government to protest any persecution. The federation, adopting a motion rejecting suggestions that Canada be represented at the Vatican, said such a move would give "extraordinary status to the Roman Catholic Church." A third resolution called for a ban on the sale of sweepstakes tickets and asked private organizations to refrain from any form of gambling "no matter how worthy the use of proceeds."
