Services Unification Seen "Difficult But Possible"

OTTAWA (CP)—The heads of the air force and the army say that unification of the Canadian armed services will be difficult but can be achieved. Both have called on their men to tackle the job proposed in the defence white paper on the defence Minister Heilbrer.

Air Marshal C. R. Dunlap, chief of the air staff, issued a statement to all RCAF personnel calling for fortitude, vigor and flexibility to adjust to the new circumstances. A similar statement was issued by Lt. Gen. Geoffrey Walsh, chief of the army's general staff, saying the army would react with vigor and dispatch to make the new organization as effective as possible.

Gen. Walsh said he is convinced the long-term advantages "will far outweigh the difficulties which one must anticipate in the changeover."

Both military leaders said a career prospects will still be good. Mr. Dietermbaker, flying home for Easter, said the unification plan could result in a loss of individuality. He said Mr. Heilbrer's earlier action to demobilize some reserve forces had "seriously weakened the navy and, generally speaking, there has been a very marked drop in morale."

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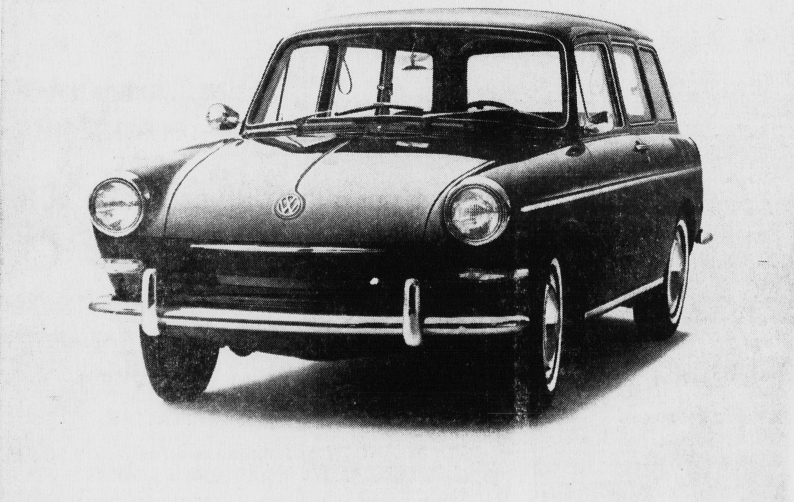
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
