Rovers In 6-4 Win Over Stars In City Baseball League Tilt

The Northeast Rovers came up with a 6-4 victory over the East End Stars in a well-played City Baseball League contest at Memorial Field last night when both clubs made their debut in league play for the season.

The victory puts the Rovers on a tie basis for the league leadership with Northwest Falcons who captured the league opener against West End Anchors on Sunday.

The game was called on account of darkness after six and one half innings.

It was a four-run rally by the Rovers in the bottom half of the sixth that brought them from behind to a 3-2 deficit to put them on top after trailing all the way. It was left-fielder Billy Purcell's three-bagger with the bases loaded that put three runs across the plate and then scored himself on centre-fielder Irv MacKinnon's error to put the game in the bag.

Harold Howatt scored Stars final run in the top of the seventh. Howatt got on with a two-base hit, went to third on a passed ball and came home on Maurice Williams' single.

Stars shortstop Gus Flynn swung the heavy bat of the game when he slammed a home run into left field in the second with nobody on for the first score of the game. Other long hitters were Phil Murphy with a triple in the sixth and Junior McLeod with a two-base hit in the fourth.

Benny Carson was the winning hurler when he relieved starting pitcher Phil Murphy in the fifth while Rovers were trailing 2-1. Carson really came through with some clever hurling to strike out seven of the 12 batters who faced him, giving up two runs and two hits. Murphy struck out five, gave up three hits and two runs in the first four innings. Harold Hennessey did the receiving.

Junior McLeod went the full route as the losing hurler, but came up with a good performance. He struck out five batters and gave up seven hits for six runs. Rovers chalked up four errors and Stars five.

U. S. Open Golf Tourney Opens On Thursday

 BIRMINGHAM, Mich., June 12 (AP) — The 51st United States open golf championship begins its three-day grind at Oakland Hills Thursday with the big question marks curling around the heads of Ben Hogan, Bobby Locke and Sam Snead.

Can defending champion Hogan, the miracle come-backer, bounce out of semi-retirement and become the third triple winner in history?

Can Locke, the pudgy South African with the magic putter, become the first foreigner since England's big Ted Ray in 1920 to take the prized title?

Can Snead conquer a long-time jinx and crash through to his first open crown?

A field of 162, including 10 winners of the title besides Hogan, will tee off in threesomes of the first of four rounds, starting at 9 A.M. E. D. T. Thursday.

The second round is scheduled Friday with the windup Saturday a 36-hole test of endurance over the 6,927-yard, par-70 layout. The course has been trapped and tightened by the noted golf architect, Robert Trent Jones.

"I predict no man will break par for the 72 holes," said Jones. "If any man can crack this rugged par, observers say it will be either Hogan or Locke, two nerveless competitors."

The grunt and groaner will hold the sporting spotlight at the Forum tonight and if advanced publicity means anything it should be a bang-up show. Four of the best wrestlers among those who travel the Maritime circuit are expected to put on a show tonight that local mat fans won't forget in a hurry.

Billed on the card will be Len "Cowboy" Hughes, who is no stranger to fans here, and will go against Ivan Rasputin, better known as "The Russian Bear," while two veritable giants, Tiny Mills and Guy LaRose, will grapple in the second event. Both contests will be best two of three fall affairs on a sixty-minute time limit.

The Hughes-Rasputin clash has all the prospects of being a rugged battle that will pit the only two well-known skill of Hughes against the slam-bang tactics of "The Russian Bear" who sacrifices speed in favor of the rough stuff that will give fans a rough full of action in thrills and spills, plus good wrestling. The "Cowboy" who hails from Northampton, Mass., packs plenty of speed and wallop into his 220-pound frame, while Rasputin, who is about as broad as he is long, is a package of dynamite in any matman's language.

To say that the Mills-LaRose meeting will be a "battle of the giants" is putting it mildly. They are two big grapplers who know how to combine speed and wrestling science with their big frames. Both are newcomers to local wrestling fans. LaRose, who is a protégé of the famous French-Canadian grappler Yvon Robert, hails from Montreal and is 6' 3" in height and weighs 230 pounds. Mills is even bigger, hailing from Great Falls, Montana. Mills is a giant of a man, packing about 260 pounds of brawn into his 6' 4" frame. What will happen when these two big boys get in the ring together tonight can be left to your own imagination.

Forum manager Bill Brown stated yesterday "We are bringing in referee Harding of Halifax, a former mat man himself, especially to handle the bouts to make it a top-notch affair all the way." So there you have it. If it is action you want fans, the Forum is where you will find it tonight.

Rasputin is known as the Russian Bear, a roly-poly shaped ruffian who throws his weight around with reckless abandon. He isn't built for speed but he gets around with amazing agility. He is built for the more rugged stuff, and that's where he shines.

Tiny Mills is a giant of a man, who weighs in the vicinity of 260 and dotes on strongarm stuff. He is a newcomer to the Maritimes, like Rasputin, and his reputation has preceded him.

Len Hughes needs no introduction to Charlottetown sports fans. He is one of the most accomplished wrestlers in the game, good in the rugged going and slick in the scientific stuff.
