Outlook Is Called Bright For Export Of Newsprint

MONTREAL (CP)—The 1963 export outlook for Canadian newsprint is bright but not brilliant, says the newspaper association of Canada. Exports to the United States, Central and South America should increase while those to Britain and the Far East should drop slightly, an association report said. Exports to Western Europe apparently would not change. Preliminary estimates show 5,255,000 tons of newsprint going to the United States in 1963 compared with an expected 5,400,000 in 1962. To Central America 153,000 tons in 1962 compared with 160,000 in 1963; South America 80,

000 tons compared with 120,000. The Far East 158,000 tons compared with 140,000 and Britain 500,000 this year compared with 485,000 for the coming year. Exports to Western Europe should remain at 10,000 tons. **BIGGEST PRODUCER** Not only is Canada the biggest producer of newsprint in the world, exporting 7,34,038 tons last year, she is also one of the biggest consumers. The Canadian consumption of newsprint now totals more than 500,000 tons a year, an amount all Prairie crude shipped to the U.S. east of the Rockies, and to Ontario.

Germany, France and possibly Russia. The long-range picture for the industry also seems fairly bright, on the basis of an association chart illustrating a 35-year history of capacity and demand. The chart discloses a "tremendous increase in both demand and capacity in the last 15 years... which seems likely to continue." What about trade with Communist countries? The association says a greater demand for newsprint in these countries, due to "a high degree of literacy and a steadily rising standard of living." However, it says available foreign exchange will be used more for paper-making equipment than for buying newsprint.

Canadian Oil To Be Absorbed

OTTAWA (CP)—Increases in Canadian crude oil production next year will be absorbed by the Ontario market rather than by continued substantial exports to the United States, it was indicated Tuesday before the National Energy Board. This is in line with the new U.S. oil import policy explained to the Canadian government last week in talks in which Canada accepted limits on crude oil exports.

The occasion was a half-day hearing of an application by the Interprovincial Pipe Line Company to double facilities on a stretch of about 41 miles from near Souris, Man., to the international boundary. The project, to be pondered by the board and then the cabinet although there is no opposition, could be completed by next Aug. 31 at a cost of \$3,200,000, the board was told. Chaput Announces Formation Of Quebec Provincial Party

MONTREAL (CP)—Marcel Chaput, leading figure in Quebec's secession movement, announced formation of a new Quebec provincial political party to be called Le Parti Republicain du Quebec (Republican Party of Quebec).

for those who wish to work for independence.

The 43-year-old Mr. Chaput made the announcement at a press conference, speaking in French. He said the decision to form the party came after "long and arduous reflection for I don't want to launch myself into such an adventure just on a whim. But I believe fervently the moment has come for action." He said the main reason is "the necessity of a union among the many forces of separatism."

British Tighten Discharge Rule
LONDON (Reuters)—Members of the British armed forces will no longer be able to get a discharge simply by saying they want to run for Parliament. Home Secretary Brooke announced Tuesday. This means applications for discharge made by more than 500 servicemen to run in the forthcoming parliamentary by-elections at Bodochan and Colne Valley in the north of England will not be granted. Brooke told Parliament "a stated intention to contest an election will no longer be accepted as a reason for discharge where an application for discharge on other ground would have been refused."

Mr. Chaput resigned as president of the separatist movement Rassemblement pour l'Indépendance Nationale, to contest Quebec's last provincial election as an independent and was defeated. He remained, however, director-general of the organization. Monday night he made reference to two other separatist movements, l'Action Socialiste and l'Alliance Laurentienne.

Brooke said the system by which would-be parliamentary candidates were given an immediate free discharge provided a unique means of release from the forces. It was not even necessary for the "candidate" to actually run in the election. Brooke said an alternative might be for the services to release members on leave to fight by-elections and then have the right to recall them.

At the request of the National Art Gallery, the newspaper says, the Ontario attorney-general's department is conducting an investigation through the Ontario Provincial Police.
