BOERS HAVE ADVANCED SOUTH OF ESTCOURT

Communication With Est court Interrupted

British Troops Ready to Advance From East London—Buller Will Punish all Acts of Disloyalty. Boers Will Probably have to Fight Soon—A Battle Imminent.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 22.—General Buller has telegraphed the officer commanding at Queenstown, Cape Colony, Nov. 15, as follows:

"General Gatacre, with the first Battalion of the seventh brigade started from East London yesterday.

"Owing to the distance between England and the Cape it has not been possible to give the frontier districts at first the protection they merit.

"Make it known as widely as possible that Her Majesty's Government

WILL EXACT COMPENSATION

in full for all actual injuries done by the enemy to the property of individuals remaining loyal to the British crown.

"Take every means possible to record the names of every person guilty of disloyalty with a view of the consideration of their cases afterwards."

LONDON, Nov 22.—Late last evening the War Office made public two despatches from General Buller at Cape Town. The first of these despatches was received from General Clery, the British commander at Estcourt, and is dated Monday, November 20, and announces that

THREE PRIVATES WERE WOUNDED the previous day in an attack with the Boers at Mooi River, twenty miles south of Estcourt.

DURBAN, Nov. 22.—The Government has received the following advices from Colonel Royston, the commandant of the British volunteers at Ladysmith, under date of November 16: All the volunteers and police are well. There are

for men and horses. All was quiet yesterday and the same condition of affairs exists this morning. There has been no further bombardment by the Boers, and the effects hitherto have been trifling. We are anxious for news from the south.

PIETERMARITZBURG, Nov. 22.—The Boers are now advancing south of Estcourt, and have been reported to

HAVE REACHED MOOI RIVER,

which is twenty-one miles south of Estcourt and fifty-five miles north of Pietermaritzburg. The Boers are accompanied

by artillery, and fighting is considered imminent.

The second despatch was from Colonel Baden Powell, dated at Mafeking November 6th, saying that all were well there.

"We have had a few successful sorties and our loss is two officers and seventeen men killed, four officers and twenty men wounded. The enemy's loss is heavy, and his numbers are decreasing. His guns, however, remain, and shell us, keeping out of range of our small guns. We have had

NO NEWS SINCE OCTOBER 20 from the outside world.

DURBAN, Nov. 22.—Communication with Estcourt is now interrupted, probably by the Boers, who have advanced considerably to the southward of that place.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—A despatch to the Daily News from Cape Town explains yesterday's rumour regarding the reported presence in the neighborhood of De Aar of the Free State General, Commandant Viljoen, who, according to previous reports was killed at the battle of Elandsplaagte.

The Viljoen, who is operating with the Boer troops near Deaar Junction turns out to be the brother of the Commandant who was captured by the British.

YOUNG CONSERVATIVES CLUB.

SIR.—The following from a writer in the Montreal Star is worthy of being put in operation in Charlottetown where the young Conservatives should organize and discuss the different political questions of the day. There are large numbers of young Conservatives in this town who would hail with delight such a movement.

"The future of this Dominion—yes, and of the British Empire, too—will be entrusted to those who are the young men of today. Let them qualify themselves for the trust.

"Now, how is this political education to be effected? True, we can learn much by listening to the old campaigners, but we do not desire to be listeners always, and when in the presence of those older and better qualified politically we feel a considerable diffidence in assuming anything but the respectful attitude of the listening disciple.

Let the young men of this constituency have a political association of their own, with a thorough organization and hustling officers. Let them have meetings at certain times where the acts of the Government and the questions of the day may be thoroughly discussed among them, where the young man will learn to express his opinion, on his feet, before a critical audience.

"By this means we may acquire some measure of a political education, and as our knowledge increases our interest will increase, for the measure of political interest and enthusiasm is the measure of our knowledge."

Glorious War.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—A nursing sister in the military hospital at Ladysmith, in the course of a letter dated October 26, to an ex-Lord Mayor of London, says: "The glorious battle at Elandsplaagte was a mighty success, but at what cost! All night Saturday the wounded streamed in, and all day Sunday. We not only had all the beds filled, but the wounded were lying about the floor as thickly as we could put them. We could only just step between them to administer to their wants. They were wet and cold.

Some had been lying for 30 hours on the wet ground. They told sad tales of suffering, but there were no complaints or murmurings. Their bravery and endurance were marvellous. There were several wounded Boers, and it was really amusing to see large-hearted Tommy Atkins fraternizing with his enemy. There was a touching little scene yesterday. A Gordon Highlander had an arm amputated. A Boer in the next bed had his arm amputated in exactly the same place. I took charge of the latter when he was brought from the theatre. When he became conscious the two poor fellows eyed each other silently until the good-natured Tommy Atkins could stand it no longer. 'Sister,' he called 'give him two cigarettes out of my box. Tell him I sent them. Here's a mac.' Light one for him.'

"I took the cigarettes and the message. The Boer turned and looked in amazement. Then he was overcome, and burst into tears, and the Highlander did the same. I am afraid I was on the point of joining them, but time would not permit.

"We have a splendid staff of skilled surgeons, and they are kept constantly at work."
