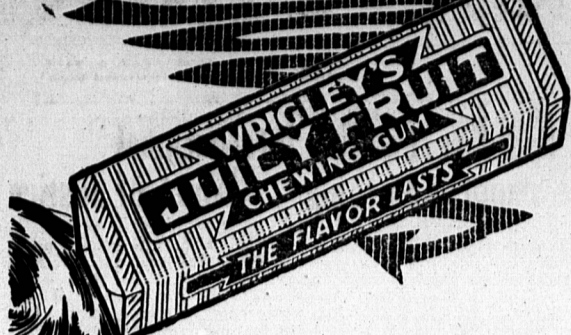

Islander In Consular Service In Russia

(From the Woburn News)

The Fall River man, who was fired on in the streets of Moscow, Russia, according to the news dispatch received in Boston on Monday, was James E. Callaghan, who formerly lived at 39 Massasoit st., Woburn, and is a son of Mr. J. M. Callaghan of Lake Verde, P. E. I. Mr. Callaghan is 24 years old and is well known about the city, particularly in athletic circles.

According to information received Mr. Callaghan was with J. B. Murray of Woburn, when they were fired upon by street patrols and Mr. Murray was wounded. When Harold J. Lawrence of 107 Pleasant street read the account of the happening in Monday night's News he at once realized that it was his friend and former companion. Mr. Callaghan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Callaghan, who now reside in Boston.

To bear out this contention, Mr. Lawrence had a postcard from Callaghan, mailed from Brussels and dated Feb. 11th in which he wrote, "On my way to Russia. Am wearing my Russian underwear." Mr. Callaghan has been away from this city for four years, the first two years being spent in the employ of the war department at Washington. For two years he was secretary to the American consul at Prague, Czechoslovakia.

To months ago Mr. Lawrence received a letter from him while still at Prague in which Mr. Callaghan said that he was going to get a change of post and wanted to go to Russia provided he could get a position as vice consul. Then when Mr. Lawrence received the postcard, with the information that Mr. Callaghan was one the way to Russia he concluded that he had been named vice consul. BODIES ARE LANDED

DUBLIN, May 12—The landing of the bodies of sixty-four Irish American soldiers who were killed in the world war began this morning. (No ceremony attended the landing. The bodies were brought here by the steamer Milwater, which arrived on Sunday from Antwerp.

Richard R. Willey, the American vice consul and Captain W. R. Buckley, U. S. A., were present when the bodies were being taken off the steamer, but no relatives of the soldiers came to the dock. The bodies were conveyed to the morgue. It is expected that several weeks will elapse before all of them are delivered to relatives and interred.
