Spirit Of Adventure Urged For World Trade Problems

TORONTO (CP) — Canadians should meet the challenge of changing world trade patterns in a "spirit of adventure," G. Arnold Hart, president of the Bank of Montreal, said Monday night in an address to the Toronto Board of Trade Club.

By and large, he said, Canada has natural advantages in many of the products of farms, forests and mines that should enable her to maintain her position in them in world markets.

Along with this, every effort should be made to develop new products based on Canadian raw materials, in an attempt to achieve further fabrication to develop into later stages of production abroad.

In further fields, aggressive salesmanship had demonstrated it is possible to sell abroad some products not usually exported from Canada.

To achieve these ends, research and development expenditure would be needed on a much larger scale than at present.

MAKES SUGGESTION
 "I am suggesting," Mr. Hart said, "that in the long run it would be in our interest, not merely to attempt to maintain our existing markets or to open up new avenues for the export

Lord Mountbatten Is Backed By British War Historians

LONDON (Reuters) — Five British war historians came down on the side of Admiral Lord Mountbatten in his wartime feud with the late Gen. Joseph (Vinegar Joe) Stilwell.

In the third volume of the British official history of the war against Japan, the historians said the U.S. general seemed to have lost all sense of what his troops could achieve shortly before he returned from the Burma campaign.

Mountbatten warned him of "the possible serious accusation of keeping men in battle who are unable to defend themselves," they said.

The historians also accused Stilwell, who was deputy under Mountbatten's supreme command in Southeast Asia, of working behind his superior's back by utilizing his positions as commanding general in the U.S. China - Burma - India theatre and chief of staff to Chinese Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek.

Stilwell, who died in 1946, regarded Mountbatten as a "university undergraduate" according to letters written to his wife and published in 1948.

REVIEW SITUATION
 The five British historians, led by Maj. Gen. Woodburn Kirby, reviewed the period between August, 1943, to August, 1944, in their volumes.

The book described Stilwell's differences in the summer of 1944 with Brig. W. D. A. Lentaigne who took over from Maj. Gen. Orde Wingate as commander of special long-range penetration columns of guerrillas in Burma.

The evacuation of the troops had become urgent but Lentaigne and Stilwell disagreed about timing. Lentaigne wanted the brigades evacuated within a short time but Stilwell held that they should be moved when he decided operations permitted it.

To settle the dispute, the authors said, Mountbatten had to intervene and warn Stilwell: "To rely on troops no longer

Talks Planned On Productivity

OTTAWA (CP) — A labor-management conference on methods of increasing productivity in Canada will be held March 15-16 at Queen's University, Kingston, Ont.

Final arrangements for the seminar were made at a two-day meeting of the national productivity council which ended Tuesday.

The seminar will be attended by company and union heads including CPB president N. B. Camp, Claude Jodoin, president and William Dodge, executive vice-president of the Canadian Labor Congress; Dr. Eugene Forsey, CLC research director; J. H. Smith, president of Canada's General Electric; and Dr. J. J. Deutsch, vice-principal of Queen's University.

The productivity council, set up by the federal government last March, also announced two other steps being planned.

Quebec representatives on the 25-member council will make a study during March of productivity agencies in France and Belgium.

A group of experts will make a cross-Canada tour in June to develop interest by management and labor in work-study programs to improve production and distribution methods and management techniques.
