LIEUTENANT-GOVERNORSHIP.

It is reported about town, to-day, that Dr. MacIntyre, of Souris, has at length been selected for the office of Lieutenant-Governor of this Province. We are unable to verify the report, and can only say that it has reached THE EXAMINER through sources which are usually authentic. In any case it is not likely that the appointment will be made until after the close of the present session of the Legislature.

CIVIC MATTERS.

It has lately been remarked that the corner-loading nuisance is increasing. In point of fact, it is now spread all along the sunny sides of our principal streets; and tobacco spittle, coarse jokes, impertinent remarks and blasphemy fall upon the ears and eyes of passing citizens or strangers. In a city of the pretensions of Charlottetown the nuisance is to say the least discreditable. But how is it to be abated?—that is the question. One of our correspondents finds fault with Councillor Crabbe and other Councilors because a bylaw in this regard has not been passed. This is ridiculous. The police have power, without a special by-law, to cause the loafers to move on. What is really needed is additional force; for what is the use of law without power to carry it out? At present we have a marshal and six policemen. Only three of the latter are on duty at any one time, and one of these must needs keep guard at the station. So there are only two policemen for street duty—two for the day and two for the night. It is manifestly impossible for these two men to perform all the duties appertaining to their office and at the same time deal specially and effectively with the corner-loading nuisance. That two men can preserve any degree of order in a city of this size is proof (if proof were needed) that the mass of the citizens are law-abiding and exemplary in their conduct, and that even "free run" does not operate greatly towards disorder. It is to be regretted that Councillor Crabbe's resolution, submitted to the council a few weeks ago, providing for the appointment of two additional policemen, was voted down and we hope that the proposition will be reconsidered, with special regard to the abatement of the corner loading nuisance.

—It is significant that after the battle, yesterday forenoon, Mr. Speaker Cumiskey brought in a ruling to the effect that the Hon. Mr. Campbell was perfectly in order when on the previous day, he moved the House into committee of privileges—though this was disputed by the Government party and though the motion was voted down by the majority. This incident proves that Mr. Campbell is solid in his knowledge of parliamentary procedure, and that the Speaker is not disinclined to do the right thing, if only the party would let him.

—Hon. Mr. Gordon has given notice that he will tomorrow ask the Provincial Treasurer to lay on the table of the House a statement showing the amounts due by the Government on the 27th April, 1899, to the banks, and the name or names of the bank or banks and the amounts due each respectively, the amounts due by debentures and private loans, and the amounts due for loans from companies, corporations, and private individuals respectively not included in debentures or provincial loans.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Gazette reports that a new copper roof is being put on the Montreal post office, at the contract price of \$9,400. No one seems to have seen an advertisement calling for tenders for the work. Tenders seem to be looked on with disfavor by the present Ottawa administrators.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Maland Empire: There appears to have been some very extraordinary work in the Brockville election, and gross irregularities are charged. We invite Mr. Sifton to look into this matter. When he thought there had been frauds in a Manitoba constituency he employed four Pinkerton detectives, retained a half a dozen lawyers, and spent \$19,000 in hunting up the rascals. Let him get to work at Brockville without delay, or else confess that his morality is spasmodic.

Montreal Gazette: There can be no graver offence against representative institutions than that indicated in the reports that have come from Brockville. By the use of fraudulent ballots in the manner indicated, a bribing election agent was assured that the voter delivered what he sold. He took into the polling place a marked ballot and brought out a blank one given him by the returning officer. This latter was acceptable evidence that he had deposited the one he had illegally received, and, when marked, could be used for another corrupted franchise holder. It is a simple, but a bold game, and if those who were guilty can be detected their punishment should be severe. The prominence of the case will make it impracticable to arrange its withdrawal, which a too lenient public opinion has come to look upon as the ordinary result in such matters. The magistrate, and all concerned should understand and do their duty, without favor and without fear.

Manitoba Elections.

WINNIPEG, April 26. — It has been given out by those who have the ear of the Government that the provincial nomination on July 21. Of course the Ministers, when asked regarding the report, try to make light of it, and say that it is news for them, but at the same time they are looting no time in getting every Grit in the country on the voters' list. The Conservatives have not been taken by surprise by any means. They expected the Government would plunge the elections on at short notice and they have been working quietly but effectively for some months. Mr. W. H. Hastings, the Conservative organizer, has just returned from a trip up the M. and N. W. Seen by your correspondent, he said the country was in excellent spirits and confident that the Greenway Government will be defeated.
