## 25 Winter Works Projects Approved

**SUMMERSIDE** — The estimated total cost of the twenty five winter works projects that have been approved to date throughout the province amounts to \$330,000 Minister of Welfare and Labour Hon. Henry Wedge announced yesterday. Mr. Wedge said the estimated total payroll amounts to \$152,000 which the federal and provincial governments will pay approximately \$100,000. The number of man-days involved in these projects amounts to 12,800.

Fifteen families are participating in the winter works plan so far this year and the type of projects to be carried out include installation of sewerage systems, street paving, building sidewalks, installing storm sewers, construction of a youth centre, a fire station, and several others.

The minister stated there are about twenty winter communities contemplating projects to be submitted for approval under the plan. He said there were 54 such projects completed in the 1961-62 season, a far cry from the first year of the winter works program in 1953 when only one community participated.

Mr. Wedge stated he is very pleased that this great interest is being taken by many communities adding that the winter works plan gives many communities an opportunity to complete projects which would be impossible, along with providing much needed employment during the winter months.

He said that since the inception of the program three island centres have built enclosed skating rinks, and about twelve others have constructed open air rinks. The town of Alberton is considering application for assistance in building an enclosed rink. Mr. Wedge stated.

# Adenauer Has Talks On Forming New Gov't

**BONN (Reuters)** — Chancellor Adenauer held a four-hour meeting with leaders of the Free Democratic Party Tuesday night as West Germany's major political parties maneuvered to form a viable government.

A joint communication issued after the meeting said all questions of their coalition, called the three-hour meeting with Adenauer "good and businesslike," providing "a good basis for further discussions."

The meeting between the two parties, apparently to discuss the possibility of a coalition, came only hours after Adenauer met his longtime bitter opponent, the Social Democratic Party, to negotiate a possible coalition with them.

Observers saw Adenauer's negotiations with the Social Democrats as potentially the most important political development in West Germany since the birth of the republic in 1949. The Social Democrats, led by West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt, have been in the political wilderness since Hitler rose to power in pre-war Germany.

A Social Democrat spokesman called the three-hour meeting with Adenauer "good and businesslike," providing "a good basis for further discussions."

One Free Democrat leader said the party would not tolerate simultaneous negotiations. Any of the possible unions would have control of the 49-seat West German parliament. The Christian Democrats have 23 seats, the Social Democrats 190 and the Free Democrats 66.

The political merry-go-round reflects the injured feelings caused by the prosecution of the new magazine Der Spiegel (The Mirror) for allegedly publishing defence secrets.
