The bible reading given yesterday afternoon in St. Paul's Church by Bishop Courtney was largely attended, and the manner of his Lordship teaching the Word of God was exceedingly original and helpful. The Bishop seems to fairly bubble over with bible knowledge, sometimes repeating long selections of it by heart, to prove his point.

In the evening, in spite of very wet weather the church was fairly well filled. The subject of the sermon was Paul before Felix, and the discourse was most touching and eloquent. It was a sermon of such power that we seldom hear or feel. If Paul spoke to Felix as did the Bishop last night, no wonder the heathen judge trembled.

The afternoon meeting was devoted to a meditation on repentance and was participated in by a large number.

The Bishop holds another bible reading in St. Paul's today at 4 p. m., and the usual service at 7 30 p. m.

Each rider will represent a merchant in a "t-king" costume, mounted on pure-blooded horses. Merchants or business men, who will be so fortunate as to be visited, for representation, are expected to do their part in responding. Only one merchant in each business is to be represented, including Hotel). WHERE MERIT TELLS.—There seems a likelihood of some interesting developments in the British educational system. There has long been a cry for a continuous ladder from the board school to the universities. Apparently it has now been reared and there are many feet on the rungs. Out of seven natural science scholarships awarded by Oxford in the last month. Three have been won by boys from the People's Palace Day School. These schools are filled with pupils from the public elementary schools, whose parents are of the artisan class. The Oxford scholarships of the value of \$400 yearly, for four years, are open to the whole Kingdom. Of these three boys, one goes to Christ Church, the most aristocratic college of Oxford; another to Magdalen, which is very select, proverbially demanding either brains, blood, or tuition.

Local and Other Items.

FIRE.—Grant's music hall, at Ottawa, was destroyed by fire on Sunday night. The loss is \$20,000.

HIGH TIDE.—Last night the tide was unusually high at midnight, having risen over many of the wharves.

THE PICTOU BOAT.—The Princess did not arrive from Pictou this morning until after eight o'clock. The thick weather detained her in Pictou until half past three. The midnight train was an hour and a half late in getting to Pictou.

BAD CROSSINGS.—Many of the crossings throughout the city are in a bad state, and require immediate attention. The one on Queen Street leading from Monaghan's corner, is almost impassible because of mud and water, and something should be done with it at once.

PRODUCE SHIPMENTS.—The sclr. Mary P., has about completed taking in cargo and will sail tomorrow for Barbadoes. Her cargo, which has been shipped by Carvell Bros., will include 2000 bags oat, 14 horses, 3 cows and a consignment of live poultry.

The same firm have also loaded the sclrs. Daniel, Morning Light and Swallow with oats. They took in cargo at East River, Orwell and Pinette, respectively.

AN ISLANDER ABROAD.—An interesting history of the city of Taunton, described as "the most progressive and picturesque city in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts," appears in a late issue of the Evening News, published in that town. Among the business places that have been written up is the establishment of J W Robertson, dealer in bicycles. Mr. Robertson is a native of Prince Edward Island, who settled in Taunton about fifteen years ago where, he has established an excellent business.

A LATE CALLER.—About half past eleven o'clock last night, in the midst of the heavy rainfall, a man, minus coat and hat, rapped at the door of a residence on Hillsborough Street, and upon the man of the house making his appearance the visitor proceeded to enter and called upon some imaginary companions to follow. The visitor had evidently been drinking and did not know what he was doing or where he was going. After obtaining an old hat from the man at whose house he called the stranger took his departure. His subsequent movements are not known.

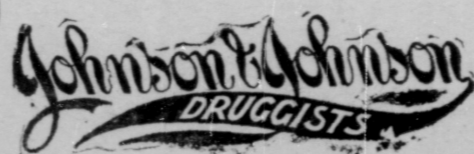
RECENT SHIPMENTS.—The Summerville Farmer says: On Monday morning Mr C Kane, of Summerville, shipped 200 lambs by the Northumberland to St John, and Mr C A McNeill, of Kensington, shipped 200 on Tuesday morning to Boston. Mr Kane has, counting recent shipments only, shipped about 2,500 head of this season's lamb crop and 50 pigs. In the same period Mr David Keefe has sent away 3000 sheep and lambs and about 150 head of cattle. These are only two of the local buyers, but they have left a matter of about \$14,000 with the farmers.

MORE SPEED.—Chief Large's purchase of Melrose adds another to the fast ones of this city. Melrose is a fast pacer, 5 years old, and a full sister of Montrose, 2207. Her dam is Presto, by Enfield Jr, and she is sired by Almont Wilkes, owned by Mr J M Nicholson, Grafton Street. While west last week Mr Large says he saw a five year old stallion sired by Almont Wilkes that is hard to beat in the Province both for speed and style, and also several others sired by the same horse, which could not be bought. Almont Wilkes is by the old standard bred stallion Hernando, 2891, and Mr. Nicholson has had him registered, so that his patrons can breed standard bred stock.

THE STORM.—Sunday's storm is reported to have been very bad in the western part of the Island. The wind blew furiously and was accompanied by snow and hail, and the highest tide on record. Private advices inform us that the Kildare Bridge, known as Father Burke's Bridge, is completely washed out. This bridge, it is said, should have been built four feet higher than it was, but the incompetency of the Public Works Department leaves it a bill of expense and unfit for travel. A schooner which was being loaded for the West Indies for Mr C B Rogers, went ashore in Cascumpe harbor having parted her cable. The telephone wires were all down as a result of the gale.
