ECONOMIC STUDY PUBLISHED

Congress Denies Labor Costs Big Factor In Price Spiral

OTTAWA (CP)—"In the labor cost debate perhaps the most common fallacy is the belief that higher wages will automatically cause higher prices which in turn will develop into inflation."

This opening sentence is the keynote in a new 6,000-word economic study published by the Canadian Labor Congress as a reply to arguments that labor must show restraint in 1966

wage demands in order to stem inflation.

Labor Costs in Canada is the first in a series of quarterly publications on current economic problems planned by the CLC's research department. It will be mailed this weekend to unions and labor federations. The booklet, which includes 12 charts and graphs, argues that in recent years Canadian labor costs have been the most stable in the Western world.

"Labor costs per unit of output have in fact been declining while prices have remained steady or risen slightly. At the same time, profits have increased rapidly. Increased wages have exerted little, if any, upward pressure on either production costs or prices."

Although a trend toward higher labor costs appeared in 1965, this was due more to a disappointing productivity performance than to wage pressures. It would be extremely

naïve to suggest that this peculiar behaviour (of 1965) marks the beginning of a new and upward trend in Canadian labor costs.

The booklet says all available evidence confirms that the price increases of recent months have been due to special factors and do not reflect basic inflationary pressures. This view had been taken in the latest report of the Economic Council of Canada.

However, inflation continued to dominate the discussion of labor costs.

"This inflation phobia is so entrenched in the minds of many Canadians—especially in the business community—that it never entirely loses its hold, even at the trough of a long recession. And when the economy has been on the upswing for a few years it resumes its place on top of the worry heap."

REVIEWS U.S. GUIDEPOSTS
The CLC study reviews the "wage-price guideposts" established in the United States and discusses the possibility of a Canadian policy along similar lines.

It says organized labor in Canada would resist any income policy which placed heavy responsibilities on unions for exercising wage restraint while allowing other forms of income to find their own level.

"On the other hand, labor would certainly give consideration to, and be prepared to discuss with other groups, an incomes policy or set of guidelines which took the returns to all factors of production into consideration."

The aim of such a policy should be to ensure that wages, profits, rents, salaries, interest and other forms of income do not rise so rapidly as to cause large and prolonged increases in price levels.

However, most of the discussion about an incomes policy made it synonymous with wage policy and, in turn, wage restraint.

COSTS UP 1 PER CENT
In a review of labor costs per unit of output, the booklet cites 1967-64 statistics showing that Canadian labor costs per unit rose three per cent while U.S. labor costs went up five per cent.

Increase in other countries were: France 42 per cent, West Germany 23, Japan 11, Netherlands 26, Sweden 16, Britain 16 and Italy 17.

This confirms the Economic Council's statement that Canadian wages are increasing much less quickly than wages in most European countries."

Later studies in the new series will deal with labor's adjustment to technological change, new international trade arrangements and federal manpower policy.

Air Fares Cut Coming In U.S.

NEW YORK (AP)—The U.S. Civil Aeronautics Board has indicated it would insist that the airlines reduce fares early next year if they do not do so voluntarily.

C.A.B. Chairman Charles S. Murphy said the fare reductions should apply both in the domestic and in the international areas.

In a talk prepared for the Federation of Financial Analysts, Murphy said he hopes it would be possible to bring about lower air fares on an informal basis so that a general investigation of fares could be avoided.

He said that during the last year the C.A.B. and the airlines have been re-examining their policies regarding fares in the light of increases in traffic and the resulting improved earnings—an 11.5-per-cent rate of return on investment for 1965, after eliminating the investment tax credit.

He noted that this re-examination has resulted in some substantial reductions in fares, most of them in the form of promotional fares designed to generate new traffic.
