Protection For Salmon Seen Lacking

MONTREAL (CP)—J. Angus MacLean, federal fisheries minister, Wednesday said fishing regulations in the Atlantic provinces are not protecting salmon properly because of "different and conflicting interests of the provinces and some-times within a province." Mr. MacLean's speech to the annual meeting of the Atlantic Salmon Association was read by Dr. A. L. Pritchard, director of the federal conservation and management service. "We at the federal level," Mr. MacLean said, "have tried to reconcile and accommodate these various interests but without, unfortunately, too much success. The result has been that we believe sincerely that the fisheries regulations are not doing as well for conservation as they were intended. Mr. MacLean said the federal government will "continue to cooperate fully with the provincial authorities." "I am confident," he said, "that we will receive their cooperation in resolving these various conflicting views in the overall interest of developing and implementing a more intensive program for the rehabilitation and expansion of the Atlantic salmon resource."

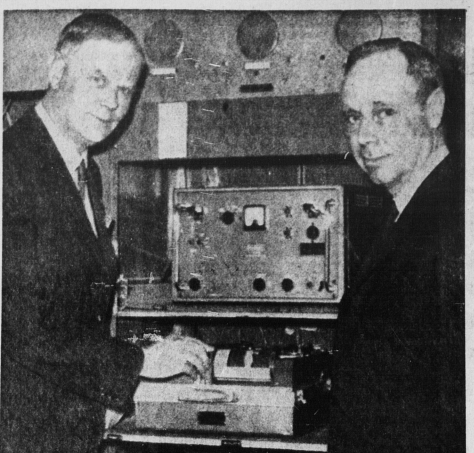

25th Parliament Is Caught With Work Unfinished

OTTAWA (CP)—Dissolution Wednesday caught the 25th Parliament with most of its work incomplete. In the 12 sitting days since the session began Sept. 27 the government placed 61 items of legislation on the Commons order paper. Of these 21 received royal assent after Commons and Senate approval. The rest died with Parliament's end. Some of the major items got through, among them the creation of the Atlantic Development Board, legislation boosting the lending powers of the Export Credits Insurance Corporation and the Farm Credit Act, a tightening of food and drug laws.

Edited off at various stages in the legislative mill were measures to get a retirement age for Senate members, to amend the British North American Act to allow contributory old age pensions, set up a National Economic Development Board and establish a commission to review electoral riding boundaries. A feature of the 25th Parliament was the firm rule by Speaker Marcel Lambert on the opening of the session. He was elected unopposed by the House on the opening of the session. TIGHTENED RULES

Speaker Lambert moved an order to tighten up the question period each session each day's sitting, forcing MPs to adhere strictly to the rule book's determination that deal with matters of urgency. Some items announced in the throne speech never did get introduced.
