[ap19] FURIOUS PROSECUTIONS.—The cases at the instance of the Department of Justice have been dragging a slow length along some days past are about completed. Some time ago a reward was offered by the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the conviction of the persons who committed a severe assault on the Fishery Warden—L. Garnum, of the River—and which has excited considerable interest, for the reason that the persons accused are respectable residents of the city. So far as we understand it, the necessary charges of infringement of the Fishery Laws have been cleared off, by arrangements, resulting in a conviction, before Mr. Duvar. Curley, on trial for the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke, was yesterday found guilty and sentenced to be hanged on the 18th of May. Another Explosion. LONDON, April 19.
