SAFEGUARDING OUR HERITAGE

Canada is the most highly favored land on earth. From every point of view our people have advantages granted to no other nation. Mineral resources, rich beyond the wildest dreams of avarice, are being discovered just as the world's fertile fields and gardens, our fertile fields and gardens, our rivers, lakes and seas are producing food for millions. Our rights, freedom and opportunities are our heritage from the past; our way of life is bright with promise, especially when compared with the slavery under which other peoples groan, etcetera.

All this is common talk, and as elections loom up before us it will be served up to us in a myriad of forms. But do we ever pause to ask — what for? Are we using these endowments and privileges to serve the purpose for which they were given or for any noble purpose whatever?

The prophet Jeremiah has something to say to us on this point. His people were flattering themselves that their temple, the sacred shrine of Jehovah, guaranteed their security. An hundred years before, Isaiah had affirmed that the shrine of Jehovah would not be profaned by the feet of the heathen, and his stand had been vindicated by the miraculous destruction of the army of the Assyrian invader.

What was true then was true for all time, they believed. But Jeremiah pointed to the injustice and immorality prevalent in the land, and asked: "Does a just God demand you in order that you may carry on these abominable practices? You are a favored people — what for?"

The prophet's words are worth repeating: "Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, Am I will guarantee this place as your permanent home. But put no trust in lying messengers who say: 'This is the temple of the Lord.' For if you really amend your ways and your doings; if you really do justice between man and man; if you abstain from the oppression of the resident alien, the fatherless, and the widow; from the shedding of innocent blood in this place and from devotion to other gods to your own hurt, then I will guarantee you a home here for all time in the land that I gave your forefathers.

Mossadegh Fears Assassination By Shah's Court Plot



Iran's Shah Reza Pahlavi (above) was accused by Premier Mossadegh of plotting to kill the premier. The accusation comes after a long series of disagreements between Mossadegh and other elements in Iran, some of whom favor retention of the monarchy for no other purpose than to provide a balance of power for themselves. When the Shah announced he was leaving Iran last month, mobs threatened Mossadegh's life and persuaded the Shah to remain. Mossadegh's latest appeal to the people for support said that several members of the Shah's court and immediate family were involved in the plot to assassinate him.
