# MMHL Defers Decision On Important Point

HALIFAX, (CP)—The Maritime Major Hockey League, holding its annual meeting here Sunday, deferred decision on its future classification until its next meeting July 26 at Sydney.

The only major league still in operation, the circuit's problem is whether to remain in the major series, turn professional or revert to Allan Cup play.

The MMHL was left by itself in major play during the last season when the Quebec Senior Hockey League turned professional. C. R. MacDonald, Glace Bay, vice-president of the league and former president of the old Cape Breton senior circuit, was elected president, replacing Judge J. Elmer Hudson, president of the league since its formation two years ago, was lauded by the league for his work.

Vice-presidents are: Gilbert Gaudet, Charlottetown; Roy Ducharme, Sydney; and J. E. (Ge) Ahearn, Halifax. The appointment of a secretary and treasurer will be made at the next meeting.

George Dudley, secretary-manager of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, met with club owners in a closed session earlier Sunday. Dudley explained the operation of the C.A.H.A. to the MMHL members.

Don McLean and P. M. Lowe represented a New Glasgow group interested in bringing Allan Cup hockey to the Pictou County town. They said that New Glasgow would seek a berth if the league decided to revert to Allan Cup play.
