OLIVETTE.

A NUMBER of the friends of the performers and representatives of the press were privileged to be present at a charming dress rehearsal of Andran's charming opera comique, Olivette, which is to be presented at the Masonic Temple Opera House on Thursday and Friday evenings, under the auspices of the Oddfellows of Charlotte town. That everyone was delighted with the performance goes without saying, and those who attend its presentation on the evenings mentioned cannot be other than pleased. The action in the opera passes at Perpignan, in the centre of Roussillon, on the shore of the Mediterranean, under Louis XIII. The music is brilliant, the dialogue humorous, and the costumes, which were imported from Montreal expressly for the occasion, are exceedingly handsome and picturesque. The stage settings are very complete, and the characters have been carefully cast. Miss Edna Sinclair makes an exceedingly good Olivette, her singing being excellent and her acting capital. Mrs. E. H. Norton very sustainably the character of the Countess de Merillac, singing and acting well, and the other ladies in the cast are also well up in their respective parts. Mr. Brenner, without whom no success is to be expected from any company, has a good part as the Duke de la Roche, and does it full justice. In the first act of Olivette, the people of the village of Perpignan are excited over the approaching marriage of the Countess's only daughter, Olivette, with an old sea captain, De Merillac. The young lady has just returned from a convent with the niece and the other ladies in the cast are also well up in their respective parts. Mr. Brenner, without whom no success is to be expected from any company, has a good part as the Duke de la Roche, and does it full justice. Mr. Arthur Peake, as Valentine, is also exceedingly good, and Mr. Leslie Cook makes a capital Captain de Merillac. In the second act, the Countess, in honor of the wedding, and Valentine finds that he has to persuade not only his uncle, but himself, by constant change of dress. The real De Merillac returns, and is greeted by everybody as the happy bridegroom. Finally his perplexity is solved by the appearance of Valentine as the old man, and the result of the explanation is that De Merillac resolves to let the bride herself choose a husband. A conspiracy is formed by the Duke de la Roche, who for the sake of his wealth is a suitor for the hand of the Countess, and Olivette, by joining the plot, is instrumental for the moment in the elderly marriage. The love of the Countess for Valentine, upsets the calculations of Olivette. For the sovereign lady of Roussillon manages her interest of marrying to the Duke de la Roche, and she is horrified to hear the Duke tell Valentine of his courtship of Olivette. Both uncle and nephew disown the bride until the return of the Countess and the unveiling of Olivette. Valentine at last is united to Olivette, the Countess accepts the Duke de la Roche and De Merillac is advised to follow the example of the Duke of Venice and "marry the sea."
