

Maritime Two-Year-Old Record Broken

Surprise Victories Are Feature Of Events Raced Under Lights Last Night

Chocolate Dip and Bessie Budlong raced their way to surprise victories in the first and second dashes of the 2.20 Pace last night to highlight a great night's racing before a tremendous crowd of fans at another Old Home Week racing meet.

Bessie Budlong's victory in the second dash of the event was the upset win of the night. The Dip's victory, although a big surprise to the betting public, was no upset for he came back to race a hard mile in the last heat and win by half a length.

Wayne S. Grattan also figured in the surprise picture as he placed second in the second heat of the 2.20 Pace. The quinnella on Bessie Budlong and Wayne S. Grattan paid the staggering sum of \$571.40.

The pari-mutuel pays were easily the largest of the week and the \$100,000 was handed out this summer. Chocolate Dip set the pattern when he came home a winner in the first heat to pay \$112.50.

The daily double on Chocolate Dip and True Single G. paid \$247.50. Then Bessie Budlong on a ten dollar win ticket and \$50.00 for a place duet. A place ticket on Wayne S. Grattan paid \$64.20.

There were two quinnella winners. One was held by Tom Doyle of Charlottetown, a retired railway engineer and the other was purchased by a man from Halifax.

Peter Clegg won the first and third dashes of the 2.25 Pace while Whispering Hope took the second dash. True Single G. won the first dash of the fast class and Vella La Vella took the second.

In the first race of the 2.25 Pace the Don MacNeill driven Peter Clegg was an easy winner. Maxie Federal set the pace for the first three quarters before MacNeill pulled out the Clegg horse and take him under the wire with two length to spare.

Whispering Hope equalled his track record in the second heat as he came under the wire in 2:13.3-5 to beat Peter Clegg in a blanket finish.

Vernita Pearl set the pace in the early part of the mile and led the field at the quarter pole followed by Peter Clegg, David G. and Whispering Hope. Cyril Smith had Whispering Hope in the lead at the half and held him out front to the wire.

The third heat of this event produced a brilliant race between Peter Clegg and Whispering Hope. The two horses paced neck and neck from almost the three quarter mark with Peter Clegg on the inside winning by a nose.

George Sobey took Chocolate Dip away in ninth position in the first race and had him tucked in fourth at the half. The favored Becky Smith was leading the field followed by Dale B and Miss Commando.

Sobey started his drive with the Dip at the three quarter pole. He raced past Dale B and Miss Commando on the back stretch and outdistanced Becky Smith on the home stretch to win by more than a length. Time of the mile was 2:11.1 a new record for Chocolate Dip.

Becky Smith again set the pace for the second heat of the event. Bessie Budlong raced most of the mile in second place but moved into the lead in the stretch to win by a length over Wayne S. Grattan who was followed by Dale B.

Chocolate Dip raced the first half

of the third heat on the outside before he could get in on the rail but the Lee O'Brien owned horse showed plenty of stamina and track savvy as he beat off the challenge of Bessie Budlong, Mighty Deb and Rosalie H. in the stretch.

Mighty Deb who challenged from the three quarter pole placed second with the fast finishing Rosalie Hooper coming third.

True Single G. driven by Laurie O'Brien won the third race by a nose over Vella La Vella in a thrilling finish. True Single G. led all the way followed by Rusty Hanover, Texas Brewer and Miss Knox at the quarter mark.

Texas Brewer moved up to second place at the half with the fading Rusty Hanover in third and Miss Knox in fifth. As they went up the back stretch it was True Single G. Texas Brewer, Miss Knox, My Darling, Vella La Vella and Rusty Hanover in that order.

Vella started her drive from the upper turn and paced beautifully down the stretch to lose out to True Single G. by a nose.

But Vella was not to be denied in the second dash. Driver Joe MacDonald had her in second place behind True Single G. at the quarter pole. They remained that way to the stretch when Vella moved out to win by more than a length.

The grandstands were overflowing with people. A guess of 10,000 might be a conservative figure.

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—Five marksmen Thursday scored near perfect scores in the qualifying stage of the Governor-General's match to tie for first place at the fourth day of the 85th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize meet.

The marksmen—Sgt. G. B. Kay, 41, Hamilton; Lt.-Col. Steve Johnson, 48, Calgary; Maj. R. W. Hampton, 39, Camp Borden, Ont.; Lieut. Gilmour Boa, 28, Toronto, and Sgt. Ldr. Dave Reynolds, 45, Ottawa—scored 148's of a possible 150 firing 10 rounds from each of the 200, 500 and 600 yard ranges.

The men, all Bisley shots, chalked up identical cards.

The top 300 men qualified to enter the final stage of the Governor-General's Gold Medal match Saturday which winds up the week-long meet. A shoot-off to decide the winner in the qualifying stage will be held today.

Five other marksmen posted 147's. They were A. J. Tellow, H. G. T. O. Doyle-Ditmas, both of Britain's Cambridge University rifle team; Lieut. Frank C. Sullivan, New Westminster, B.C.; Cpl. A. M. Hughes, St. George's, Mont.; and Maj. A. J. F. Roberts, Montreal.

Randles, conqueror of Pete Kelly Wednesday, and winner over Eugene Mealey, the Saint John district champion from Westfield Country Club Thursday morning, was off the fairway and into the rough no less than 12 times on the ground with Manuel.

Only a sizzling putter kept him in the match to the 18th where the same club almost gained him the hole and a playoff with Manuel.

Janet Clegg Sets Mark; Pontiac's Mile Is Best In Maritimes This Year

Maritime horsemen today will have several things to ponder over. Not the least of them will be the fastest mile of the season tramped in the Maritimes when she broke the Maritime record for two-year-olds in capturing the first heat of the Two Year Old Trot and Pace, by coming home in front in 2:13. But the big surprise of the afternoon came when the field of eight returned for the second and final heat. It was then that Janet Clegg fished away the blood lines by taking an early lead and holding it all the way to the wire as she flashed under to another new Maritime record as she scintillated to an unbelievable mark of 2:17 2/5. She was four lengths ahead of the field when she finished.

Janet Clegg is owned by George Sobey, Summerside, one of the better known trainers and drivers in this Province.

A Surprise Mile (formerly known as Historian) shocked all fans as no one expected to see a mile so closely approaching the track record. It came in the second heat of the event after the winner of the first, Lucky Chief, Cape Breton-owned big one, had come pacing home to beat off all opposition in 2:07 4/5, to ring up the fastest.
