AT THE OPERA HOUSE.

It was a large and fashionable audience which attended the opening performance of the "Devil's Auction" Company at the Opera House last evening, and if laughter and applause are to be taken as an indication of the pleasure they experienced their cup of joy must have been full to overflowing. The "Devil's Auction," it may be explained, is an extravaganza founded upon the ideas which make up the average fairy tale. In the cast there are the evil one, the good fairies, the maidens in distress and the wicked people who endeavor to make use of the evil spirit to further their own ends. RUM SHOPS IN DISGUISE.

Sir.—This province has no pharmacy law. Every other province has a law whereby no one but a qualified and properly educated druggist can sell or dispense drugs. Why should the people of this Island have no restriction upon the sale of poison? Under the Canada Temperance Act a man having no knowledge of drugs or the effects of drugs can open a drug store, get a few Parke Davis & Co's. preparations, together with confectionery, and he is regarded as quite a druggist! He can measure out the ten ounces under said act and thus merit the name of a "Rum Shop in Disguise." Is this right? There are respectable druggists in this Island who are a credit to their profession, and men should not be permitted to disgrace a noble calling by a mere subterfuge even should Parke Davis' preparations be all right. The temperance people should make a note of this and call upon Premier Farquharson to pass a pharmacy act or place the matter under the wing of the Medical Council of this Province. A move should be made, and all right-thinking people should aid the movement, so that drug stores would not multiply by incompetent hands, for they are only a multiplication of liquor saloons by the ten ounces. There are a number of unregistered doctors who lend their assistance to the dens, and they should also be looked after as their prescriptions are not recognized by the Canada Temperance Act. Will the Medical Council prosecutor make a note of this?

President Libbey, of the Brookfield mine, deposited 160 ounces, the product of his mine for the last "clean-up," but as an accident to the machinery necessitated the closing down of the mill at this mine for upwards of two weeks the gold deposited is the product of but half a month.—Halifax Herald.
